



Renters Spotlight: Painting with friends never gets old

When you consider how Jamie, Jo, Sandra, and Diane first experienced Monteagle, it's something of a wonder that they ever came back. Or is it?

These four women were staying at Camelot last week, taking their annual trip to be with their longtime girlfriends and, incidentally, paint. If you were to press them on how long, exactly, they've known each other, you'd get different, perhaps even slightly cagey, replies.

"We've been friends since the first grade!" one told me soon after we met. But then, the next day, I heard that Jamie was the one who brought people together—she is, after all, Jo's sister and the one who has spent more of her life painting as a vocation. Diane and Sandra both told me, at different times, that they started coming on these trips because they knew Jamie first.

No matter. They grew up in Nashville (except Diane, who grew up in Arkansas) and somehow found each other, at some point; now, a few decades later, they enjoy getting together, setting up their acrylics (they're easier to clean and dry faster, Sandra tells me, though she'll probably go over the painting with oil when she gets back home). These four seem to paint whatever strikes their fancy, although their paintings early in the week seemed focused on landscapes.

Jo confides her first experience of the delights of our mountain trace back to the sixth hole of the Sewanee golf course in the 1960s. She was, at that time, a student at Peabody (now part of Vanderbilt), where there were "about 20" male students, the rest women. The University of the South was then an all-male school, so "they would put us girls on buses and haul us up" to spend time with the Sewanee students. Jo remembers making many such trips to Sewanee while at Peabody, and she went on to teach art at an Episcopal school for nearly four decades.







Jamie and Diane first spent time in Monteagle about twenty years ago, when they attended a weeklong workshop at DuBose with artist Joe Perrin, who was instrumental in establishing the School of Art and Design at Georgia State University. Once they got over the shock of the orange shag carpeting in the rooms at DuBose, they said they "fell in love with the people" and found the general atmosphere of Monteagle to be inspiring. "The air just smells fresher up here," Diane says. "But that shag carpet was … funny," adds Jamie.

Last week was their third year renting a house at the Assembly, and they don't see any reason to meet to paint anywhere else. They went to Maine once, but they don't especially



like having to figure out a new place. The MSSA grounds nearly overwhelm the group with all the interesting subjects, particularly the cottages, with their gingerbread accents and motley rooflines. When Jo or Diane struggles to get the perspective right on a roofline, they summon Jamie over to sketch in – with a pencil, or some blue paint – the right outline.

Ultimately, though, it's clear the joy of these week-long trips with old friends is more about the kindling of a decades-old friendship than it is the final product. The four have a warmth about them that invites new friends in like a cool summer breeze.



Renters Spotlight: Cousins, Cousins, Everywhere Cousins!

For some of us, the magnetic power of the Assembly gates is so strong that you only have to get within a mile or two for it to reel you in. Marion Quinlen and her family definitely fit this description.

Marion is one of the Blalock family, a sprawling group of cousins (in a family this large, isn't everyone a cousin, basically?) descended from an Assembly family that once owned the Balconies—but, Marion wants you to know, it used to be called Balcony Place, in that way we keep track of the passing of time by noting how things were years past.

After her grandparents sold the cottage with balconies, her family stopped coming to the Assembly for summers, but the spell of the grounds didn't fade

much. When Marion went to Vanderbilt as a college student, she says she couldn't drive past Monteagle without stopping to drive through the MSSA grounds, just to see what was happening, what had changed, what had remained the same.

In the 1970s, though, some of her cousins decided that too much time had passed since they last came to the Assembly; these upstarters declared that they would come back for bit of family time, and so it was. They've been coming regularly ever since.



Nowadays, the various branches of the Blalock family often number upwards of 40 at a family dinner each summer. Marion will be at Wayside this summer, her fourth year there, for two weeks. They used to stay at Camelot, she says, but the family got too big, especially with the kids (and grandkids) bringing friends along.

What's the best part about summertime in Monteagle? "The grandkids love it. They're free to ride their bikes... contained, but free," she says. "They don't have the same freedom at home."

Marion's less likely to explore the grounds on a bike these days, but she especially loves hiking the trails and sitting on the porch, where you might find her talking

about what she's reading, setting up a board game or card game, or working a jigsaw puzzle. Interlaced in all of this is the free flow of conversation with family members from all over the south—Florida, Tennessee, and beyond—who she doesn't get to see that often. Her voice is emphatic when she says that "being with family" is what makes time at Monteagle so special.

"And a quick little nap on the porch isn't bad, either," Marion says.

MSSA Too: Keeping Our Children Safe

One of the ways that we most often described Monteagle Assembly is as a "paradise for dogs and children." Fortunately, the Assembly has always been a safe place for our children to grow and learn, to test their boundaries, and to evolve their independence.

In the wake of the "me too" movement and recent, high profile abuse and assault cases, it is important that every parent know how the Assembly staff and management work to make the Assembly as secure as it can possibly be for our young people.

We start with an intensive 4-day youth staff orientation that includes training about recognizing signs of abuse, assault or harassment. Like sexual harassment, visual, verbal, or physical harassment based on race, color, age, religion, disability, national origin, or any other protected characteristic are spotlighted and carefully explained during the training. It is our goal to ensure that every child in our youth program feels welcome and included....and safe.

The staff living in the Nashville Home are also expected to comply with policies that keep youth program participants and the staff out of harm's way.

These include:

- Non-staff members are not allowed inside the Nashville Home (except during scheduled activities).
 Youth are encouraged to hang-out on the porch between 10:00 am and midnight.
- Male rooms are on the first floor, and female rooms are on the second floor. Staff members are not allowed in the rooms of the opposite sex.
- Alcohol and illegal drugs are not permitted in the Nashville Home or on the Nashville Home porch.
- MSSA does not tolerate sexual misconduct. This includes but is not limited to: engaging in any sexual

activity with a youth program participant; any inappropriate or deviant sexual activity (e.g. verbal, written, physical, etc.) with or toward any staff member; distributing any pornographic material (written, audio, video, electronic, etc.).

Parents of children in the youth program must also play a large role in keeping our young people safe.

A few reminders:

- Attend the weekly parents' meetings on the Dining Hall porch (Tuesdays at 10:15 am). This keeps you in the know and gives you the opportunity to visit with the youth staff.
- Enforce a curfew--either the official Assembly midnight curfew or your own (see program book page 11).
- If you have any concerns about safety or other issues, please report those directly to the general manager or the youth program coordinator. This allows the Assembly to go through the proper channels to investigate the issue and take appropriate action.
- Locate all emergency information in the program, and make sure your child knows where to find it. This should include the Assembly office and our security team (non-emergencies). As at home, in case of an emergency dial 911.

With your participation, we can continue to make the Assembly a safe paradise for our children (and dogs).

Week 1 Program Descriptions

Monday

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Finding Hope in Life's Unchosen Journeys," with Dr. William H. Elder, III and Linda Elder: Bill and Linda share their discoveries of trying to find hope in the midst of chaos during the past 8.5 years, following Bill's major stroke on Christmas Eve of 2009.

4:30 pm, Winfield Porch: "Partnering with Unchurched People to Find Jesus," with the Rev. Ben Cathey: One question we might ask is, "How do we get people who don't go to church to come to our church?" But the more compelling question for our modern day culture might be, "How do we help people who don't go to church relate to Jesus in lifetransforming ways?"

Tuesday

10:00-12:00 & 2:30-4:30, Mall Tennis Courts: Pickleball for All workshop, with Stephanie Lane and Melissa Powell: This clinic will focus on the grip of the paddle, footwork, and how to hit the basic shots while also learning how to keep score. 8:15 pm, Pulliam Center: *Do Not Resist* (2016, not rated) documentary: This documentary examines the implications of police departments acquiring armored vehicles and other military-grade weaponry. The film questions whether this nationwide trend serves the goal of protecting the public.

Wednesday

9:30-11:45 and **2:30-4:30**, Pulliam Center: "A Space to Shift: A Workshop for Women," with Liz Norell: We'll identify places in our lives where we want to shift something -- be that career, relationships, life satisfaction, or a combination of all of the above! -- and creating strategies to make those shifts. Together, we'll create a brave space for exploration, examination, and movement forward.

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Living Peacefully in a Restless World," with Mary Ellen Brewington: Be present, be true, clear your mind and your heart; incorporating these few peaceful life hacks in your daily habits can help you live a less stressed life in our restless world.

Thursday

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Weed Wrangle ®, a Collaborative Network," with Cayce McAlister: The Weed Wrangle® lecture will cover the invasive species most problematic for the Cumberland Plateau. The Weed Wrangle® project itself is a volunteer effort to help rescue public parks and green spaces from invasive species through hands-on removal of especially harmful trees, vines, and flowering plants.

2:30-4:30 pm, meet at the flag pole: Weed Wrangle ® As a Community: We will help you identify invasive plants and work in a collaborative effort to Wrangle the Weeds that are invading the MSSA grounds. Armed with this new knowledge, cottage owners can continue their efforts at home. Volunteers should wear sturdy, closed-toe shoes and comfortable long-sleeve shirts and long pants. Gloves and insect repellant are also encouraged. Please bring tools (clippers, loppers, or pruners) and water to stay hydrated.

8:15 pm, Warren Chapel: Performance by the Choo Choo Chorus: The Chattanooga Chapter of the Barbershop Harmony Society, now 55 years young, raises money for a variety of charities, including raising more than \$50,000 for the Boehm Birth Defects Center in recent years.

Friday

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Two Eccentric Characters and My Mother," with the Rev. Francis X. Walter: This lecture will share the stories of Chief Tallawah, a hermit of the Mobile/Tensaw River Delta and a promoter of Fort Morgan located at the mouth of Mobile Bay; Hatchett Chandler, almost a hermit, living in an abandoned late 19th century cavalry stable at the fort; and the speaker's mother, whose brave actions just might surprise you.

2:30-3:30 pm, Warren Chapel: "20 Years of NFL Football in Tennessee," with Mike Keith: The Tennessee Titans will celebrate their 20th season in 2018 and "The Voice of the Titans", Mike Keith, has called every play since the team opened Nissan Stadium.
