Shop local at the Thursday Morning Mountain Market, 7 -10:00am, in front of Harton Hall.

Call Scott First! Home repairs/upgrades are generally not permitted during the season. Contact the General Manager before calling a contractor.

Auto permits must be displayed at all times, else a ticket may be issued.

Gate tickets (or wristbands) should be on your person at all times.

Set up a Harton Hall account for cash-free dining all season long.

Box lunches and other reservations-required dining events must be paid at the main office; the dining hall will no longer accept reservations or payment.

Save time at the gate and pre-order your tickets by calling (931) 924-2286. You can also preorder online.


July 4th picnic tables are available for rent (\$25) or purchase (\$110) from the main office. The tables are 8 feet long.

Just so you know, our dumpster is not the town dump. In the last week, our dining hall dumpster has collected an old mattress, old children's furniture, a mildewed rug, a broken lamp, and a couple of broken chairs. If you've gone to the trouble to put your old wares in your vehicle, please take them to the Monteagle dump instead. The address is 800 Trussell Road, and the hours are 8:00-4:00 Monday-Saturday.

The recycling bins for aluminum, paper, and plastic are now behind Harton Hall, right outside the dumpster. We can accept cardboard boxes, as long as they are broken down and stacked in the dumpster. The covered dumpsters in the fenced area are for bagged dining hall food waste only. If you stack cardboard in the dumpster, please make sure the door is closed securely when you leave so dogs and critters can't get in. Glass and tin are not accepted here, but Sewanee has recycling of each. (Tin is accepted at the Convenience Center at 132 Missouri Ave-

nue; glass is accepted on Kennerly Avenue through the University.) The *Mountain Messenger*'s web site (www.themountainnow.com) has more information on recycling.

Morning adventure: Swimming at The Res

Check out one of the great swimming holes on the Mountain and stay through the afternoon to learn some canoe skills.

Who? All ages (extra adults accompanying younger kids is advised)

Where? SAS Reservoir

Pack? Towel, water, sunscreen, extra life jackets; lunch if you plan to stay for afternoon

Afternoon adventure: Canoeing at The Res

Learn some fundamental canoe and kayak skills at The Res. **Who?** Buzzards + Falcons

Tuesday

Morning adventure: Bridal Veil Falls + Caving Trip

Hike to a waterfall, explore a sinkhole, and stay later for a caving adventure (if desired).

Pack? Picnic lunch if desired, water, clothes that can get dirty & wet, closed-toe shoes, extra helmets/headlamps/flashlights (if possible) for afternoon caving.

Afternoon adventure: Solomon's Temple Cave

Solomon's Temple is a short drive from Morgan's Steep down Breakfield Road. We will caravan to the trailhead from Morgan's Steep.

Where? Solomon's Temple Cave, Sewanee

Pack? Water + snacks, clothes that can get dirty & wet, closed-toe shoes, extra helmets/headlamps/flashlights (if possible)

Wednesday

Morning adventure: Bouldering at Morgan's Steep

Bouldering is climbing without ropes, low to the ground, using pads to fall on.

Who? Buzzards, Falcons, Eagles (preferably accompanied by an adult)

Where? Weather dependent (ideally Morgan's Steep)

Pack? Water + snacks

Afternoon adventure: Creek Hike

Explore the fun of a creek hike down a beautiful Sewanee waterway to the most secluded swimming hole on the Mountain.

Who? Buzzards + Falcons (limit of 15)

Where? Theolog's Pool, Sewanee (trailhead on Hat Rock Road)

Pack? Water + snacks, swimsuit, towel, Chacos/sandals/ old shoes that can get wet (no flip flops)

Thursday

Morning adventure: Hike to Buggy Top Cave

Hike down into Lost Cove to one of the most picturesque locations on the Cumberland Plateau.

Who? Falcons, Buzzards, Eagles (20 limit; extra adults accompanying is advised)

Where? Buggy Top/Natural Bridge, Sewanee

Pack? Water + snacks, sunscreen, lunch, extra headlamps/flashlights, good shoes

Evening adventure: Campfire

Head down to the MSSA campsite, build a campfire, cook dinner, and play campfire games.

Who? Eagles, Buzzards, Falcons

Where? MSSA campsite

Pack? Water + snacks, flashlight/headlamp, closed-toe shoes

Friday

Morning/afternoon adventure: Hike & swim

End the week with a hike down into Fiery Gizzard to see beautiful waterfalls, swimming, and optional jumping.

Week 2 Program Descriptions

Monday

1:30-4:30 pm, Shady Dell: Getting Your Feet Wet— Exploring the Art of Watercolors, with Judson Newbern:

This workshop is geared toward gaining experience with the basic elements in working with watercolors. It will be accessible both for those new to watercolors and those who want to learn new techniques. Some drawing skills are helpful, but the goal is to have fun while gaining an appreciation for creating paintings in this very expressive media. Kits are available for purchase from the instructor for \$40.

4:00 pm, Warren Chapel: "A Conversation on C.S. Lewis," with Robert MacSwain & W. Brown Patterson: Patterson graduated from Sewanee (C'52) before receiving graduate degrees in English at Harvard and Oxford, a theological degree at the Episcopal Theological School in Cambridge, Massachusetts, and his Ph.D. in History and Philosophy of Religion at Harvard. In 1953-55 he was a Rhodes Scholar at Magdalen College, Oxford, where he had C.S. Lewis as his tutor. He has taught history and humanities at Davidson College and at The University of the South, where he was also Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences in 1980-91.
