Call Scott First! Home repairs/upgrades are generally not permitted during the season. Contact the General Manager before calling a contractor.

Auto permits must be displayed at all times, else a ticket may be issued.

Gate tickets (or wristbands) should be on your person at all times.

Set up a Harton Hall account for cash-free dining all season long.

Box lunches and other reservations-required dining events must be paid at the main office; the dining hall will no longer accept reservations or payment.

New golf carts must be registered (the registration carries over season to season). Only licensed drivers are legally allowed to drive carts.

Monteagle Assembly

Night's deep mysteries dispel themselves in wondrous birth of Dawn. The glade shimmers; comes alive. There, a tiny squirrel revels in life precariously; its threadbare sapling over glistening stream trembles with passion. It does not fall as music swells among azure mists; the birds serenade silence and peace. Light floats lazily, kissing nectar to transform green beings into jewels. Stillness moves as shadows emerge enhancing sparrows in staid oaks, their majesty quiet, fixed, lasting. I cling to this haven, to this beauty for my soul.

The Monteagle Sunday School Assembly was organized by Charter issued by the State of Tennessee on October 4, 1882 for the purpose of: "... the advancement of science, literary attainment, Sunday School interests, and the promotion of the broadest popular culture in the interest of Christianity without regard to sect or denomination."



The Mission of the Monteagle Sunday School Assembly is to be a welcoming community of Christian faith where people gather to engage in spiritual growth and renewal, lifelong inquiry and learning, recreational and cultural enrichment, while being good stewards of our natural resources and our Assembly heritage.

Week 8 Program Descriptions

Monday-Friday

9:30-11:45 am (Tues-Fri) & 2:30-4:30 pm (Mon-Fri): "Play of the Hand: Taking More Tricks" advanced bridge lessons, with Larry Hays: This class is aimed at improving your planning and play of the hand once you have bid to the optimal contract. The first goal is to make your contract and then to make as many overtricks as you can. Class will focus on developing your skills in counting winners and losers and when to do each; timing and sequence of play of the hand; developing high card tricks; developing long suits; trumping losers; and the many types and positions for finessing.

Tuesday

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "The Elephant Sanctuary," with Todd Montgomery: Herd. Home. Rest. Refuge. Individualized Care for Life. For more than 20 years, the Elephant Sanctuary has provided this and much more to retired captive elephants on 2,700 acres in Hohenwald, TN. In addition to providing care for these incredible animals, The Sanctuary educates the public about the needs of elephants in captivity and crisis facing elephants in the wild.

8:15 pm, Warren Chapel: "Our History is All Around Us — if only we look," with Harbert L. Rice Alexander: A banker in Jackson, TN, for more than 43 years, Alexander has an eclectic background and a history of community involvement and service. The author of five books, Alexander has been the Madison County historian for 23 years and serves on the Tennessee State Museum board, appointed by Governor Bill Haslam.

Wednesday

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "A Pathway Out of Predatory Loans," with Spike Hosch: BetterFi is a Tennessee nonprofit microfinance consumer loan fund. The organization hopes to solve the problem of predatory lending in Tennessee. To do this, BetterFi is piloting a program of lower-interest installment loans designed to prioritize ease of repayment and credit building for the borrower rather than profit for shareholders. By pairing these more affordable financial products with financial coaching, they hope to create more financially stable borrowers who can turn to conventional financial institutions, like banks, rather than predatory lenders.

4:30-5:30 pm, Winfield Porch: "The Story," with Rev. David Eldridge: From movies and books to songs and plays, we all have experienced the power of a compelling story to move us and to tap into our deepest longings and desires. What if our love for great stories points us to our longing for a greater story? This informal lecture will explore the connection between our love of great stories and God's redemption story that's foundational to our world and our very lives.

Thursday

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Filly, Fawn, and Falcon: A Literary Look at Coming of Age," with Dr. Wyeth Burgess: Current study of the evolution from childhood to young adulthood has rediscovered what fiction writers have long known: deep attachment to an animal companion can be crucial to the development of a healthy self. Dr. Burgess examines much loved classics such as *National Velvet, My Friend Flicka, The Yearling,* and *My Side of the Mountain* and their writers for the truth in their storytelling and their wisdom for today's youth.

2:30-3:30 pm, Warren Chapel: "The man who knew too much, and the woman who knew something more," with Dr. Leslie Richardson: If sly humor, picturesque locations, and plot twists were the only things worth mentioning in *The Man Who Knew Too Much*, the movie would have long ago lost its freshness. What really haunts our memory is his visual flair, the way he films particular scenes in which famous stars (Doris Day and James Stewart) are seen to be less familiar than we thought. In this nightmare tale about the search for a kidnapped child, a father's knowledge and a mother's intuition create a force of love that restores order and banishes the evil that is never far from the center of Hitchcock's world. See the movie Wednesday at 8:05 pm in the Auditorium, then come to this discussion!

2:30-3:30 pm, Auditorium: "Ducks in the Bathtub, Possums on the Porch!" with Margaret Matens: Hear "hare-raising" tales from a longtime wildlife rehabilitator and meet some of her favorite furry, feathered, and scaly friends.

5:00-6:00 pm, Warren Chapel: "Southern Sympathy: Feeding the Southern Soul," with Perre Coleman Magness: Nothing motivates one to get in the kitchen more than a funeral. We all seem to harbor that primordial need to comfort with food. Perre Coleman Magness, author of *The Southern Sympathy Cookbook*, will discuss the eternal need to feed and share some highly entertaining obituaries and humorous stories. She'll discuss favorite southern foods and the process of writing a cookbook.
