# FROM THE PRESIDENT: PARK THE CAR (AND THE GOLF CART), AND TAKE A WALK!

As the 2019 season approaches, there are a lot of things happening, weddings, spring cleaning, painting, landscaping, pool opening, and we are still trying to schedule a little paving on the roads. In addition, we have completed projects at Harton Hall, the Mall tennis courts, gymnasium floor, pool and auditorium bathrooms, Shady Dell, and the roof on the front of the Auditorium. The stonework repair funded by the annual fund is in progress, with most of the work focused around the Chapel area.

At the February board of Trustees meeting, the property committee recommended a raise in traffic fines. The first offense will be a warning; the second offense a \$50 fine; and each offense thereafter a \$100 fine. Any person cited for a fourth offense of the traffic regulations within a 12-month period shall have his/her driving privileges within the Assembly grounds suspended for six months. These traffic fines apply to golf carts and automobiles.

Long Range Planning: The Board of Trustees also voted to rescind a July 12, 2008 action, removing multi-term commitments on members of the Long-Range Planning Committee. Going forward, LRPC will function as do other standing committees. We want to thank Paula Walker for presenting this motion and serving as the Chair of the LRPC.

Golf carts: Remember all carts must be registered at the office and don't forget to check on the insurance for the golf cart. Is it covered on your homeowner's policy? Is it covered at MSSA? Ask your insurance agent about the coverage in the event of an accident.

I encourage you to park the car and golf cart, and take a walk around the grounds to see the improvements! Rick and his crew have the grounds looking as good as ever!

# **QUICK BITES**

Shop local at the Thursday Morning Mountain Market, 7-10:00am, in front of Harton Hall.

Trash pick-up in Week 4 will be on Monday July 1st (regular date) and Friday, July 5th (rescheduled date).

Call Scott First! Home repairs/ upgrades are generally not permitted during the season. Contact the General Manager before calling a contractor.

Auto permits must be displayed at all times, else a ticket may be issued.

Gate tickets (or wristbands) should be on your person at all times.

**Set up a Harton Hall** account for cash-free dining all season long.

Box lunches and other reservations-required dining events must be paid at the main office; dining hall staff do not accept reservations or payment.

Save time at the gate and preorder your tickets by calling (931) 924-2286. You can also preorder online.

ALL golf carts must be registered (or re-registered) to receive the 2019 decal. Only licensed drivers are legally allowed to drive carts.

Lawn trimmings are collected on Wednesdays.

Dogs must be registered, including proof of rabies vaccination. Pick up after your pets.

Quiet Hour is daily from 1:00-2:30 pm. Children should be indoors at their cottages. Tennis is only permitted on the East Gate courts. No deliveries during this time.

Trash pickup begins at 5:00 am on Monday & Thursday. Secure garbage can lids to avoid critters from getting into them. Garbage crews can only collect bagged trash located inside garbage cans.

Hummingbirds play bells at 2:30 pm Tuesday & Thursday in Warren Chapel. All Hummingbirds welcome.

Recycling bins have been moved behind Harton Hall.

Golf cart parking at Warren Chapel is for the benefit of those who need mobility assistance. Please do not move carts during services and programs.


# SUMMER CHURCH SERVICES OFFER RENEWAL

# RENTERS SPOTLIGHT: THE LOST ART OF JUST VISITIN'

You probably know someone you would describe as an *old soul* — someone who might say, as Jennifer Frank did last week, "Sometimes I just feel like I was born in the wrong generation." So when Jennifer's friend called and said, "This is your kind of place!" she decided to find out what her friends from Nashville and Memphis were raving about.

So began her first visit to the Assembly last summer, where she packed up her two kids and—at the last moment, on little more than a whim—a sno -cone machine and made her way to Monteagle. "I felt like my blood pressure went down 10 points just going through the gates," she says.

For a family of old souls, two weeks at the Assembly just wasn't enough. The Franks will be back for Weeks 1-3 this summer, and the excitement Jennifer feels about getting here on Sunday is palpable.

Her two kids, Sam (13 1/2) and Lucy (9 1/2), enjoyed their time just as much as did their mom—probably more, actually. The simple pleasures and freedom of summertime on the grounds appealed to both Sam and Lucy.

What did they love most? Jennifer struggles to choose just one thing, because there are just too many highlights. For example, Lucy, who has a real affinity for dogs, loved that Assembly dogs are *everyone's* dogs. Lucy and Jennifer went to an Arty Party together and loved getting to use their art skills together.

When Sam went off to night games, Lucy (too young to participate last summer) would wander over to Ms. Pam's house and spend the evening playing there. "She

was as happy playing at Ms. Pam's house as she was playing with kids," Jennifer marvels. "I'd have to go pick her up to get her to come home." (Editor's note: Spending time with Pam Maloof is basically everyone's favorite part of the Assembly, isn't it?!)

As a younger child, Sam was something of a prodigy chef, competing on a TV program in Hollywood as a child chef. So it was no surprise when Sam and Lucy (who's more of a baking aficionado) decided to turn their hobbies into a fundraiser, baking turtle brownies and strawberry whoopie pies to sell at the Thursday morning markets. Between that and a sno-cone sale at the pool one afternoon, Jennifer estimates they took in about \$30; after deducting their expenses, the profits went to

the Assembly as a donation.

For Jennifer and her husband Chas, the pace of the Assembly is the biggest draw. Giving their children the freedom to choose their daily activities, instead of being told what to do, feels like a throwback to an earlier, simpler time. The inter-generational activities appeal to this family of relationship-focused Franks. Instead of sending her kids off to summer camp, Jennifer feels like the Assem-

bly lets them do camp-like activities, but as a family.

"It's a throwback to how I grew up, with my granny and pa. Nowadays, everyone's in a rush. People don't just come over to visit," Jennifer says.

# **BEWARE OF THE WILDLIFE**
