#### BLACK BEAR ON SUNSET ROCK ROAD

Last Tuesday, we received a report of a black bear heading toward the MSSA Cemetery. A few tips, should you spot a bear:

- Black bear attacks are very rare. Do not approach and do not run away.
- If you see a bear in your back yard, from a safe place, make loud noises, shout, or bang pots and pans together to scare away the bear.
- Remove things from your yard that might attract a bear, such as garbage, bird seed, or pet food.
- Although this is unlikely, if a bear approaches you, make yourself look big, make loud noises, and back away slowly.

Lawn trimmings are collected on Wednesdays.

Dogs must be registered, including proof of rabies vaccination. Pick up after your pets.

#### RENTERS SPOTLIGHT: THE SLOW, QUIET, MEANINGFUL LIFE

When Jessica Abell began attending the University of the South's seminary about two years ago, spending two weeks on the mountain every six months, the Abells needed to find a place for her to stay while down from Memphis. They had heard of MSSA—her husband, Peter, had attended Camp Gailor-Maxon at DuBose, where he had also attended a men's retreat for more than a decade—but they didn't really know much about what happened here in the summertime. That is, until they started looking for things for their family to do while Jessica was busy last summer.

"It's basically like family camp!" Peter says. The opportunity for five-year-old Amos and three-year-old Molly to play with other kids was too tempting to pass up. They will be back for a second year this week.

Molly became something of an Assembly celebrity last summer, known for sporting a different pair of sunglasses each day. Now three, she'll join the Hummingbirds this week—something both she and her daddy are looking forward to.

When asked what he appreciates most about time in Monteagle, Peter's voice takes on a wistful quality as he highlights "the way having an absence of distraction brings your family closer together. There aren't TVs and those types of distractions around. We take for granted the role those play in your life. Slow, quiet time together is so meaningful, and every day was like that."

"When you have distractions, you're not really together. At the Assembly, you're truly together as a group," he continues.

As for his kids, Peter says they set a record last summer for the number of popsicles eaten in a single week. "They also LOVE to cross all of the bridges—that's one of their favorite things," he adds. "I can only imagine how big the bridges must seem to little kids."

The kids' games in the morning, Emily Frith's delicious lunches at noon, swimming in the afternoon ... these are the things the Abells appreciate about their time here.

"We live right in the middle of Memphis, so we forget about what it looks like at night without streetlights. We forget about fireflies," Peter Says. "At dusk at the Assembly, it's like a firework show. Every night the kids are running in circles grabbing fireflies."

## FROM THE PRESIDENT: TAXES & MORE TAXES

In April 2019, the Monteagle Sunday School Assembly received a letter from the County Attorney for Grundy County notifying us that the Assembly is delinquent in payment of the County's occupancy tax, despite never notifying MSSA of its obligation to collect the tax. It is the county's opinion that we operate certain "hotel" facilities as defined by Tennessee code and we should be collecting and remitting the 5 percent tax to Grundy County.

We have been collecting and remitting the 5 percent hotel tax on the rentals to the Town of Monteagle, but we will now be required to collect the tax for Grundy County as well. While the general rule is that a county cannot impose the tax within the limits of a city that also imposes an occupancy tax, the Tennessee General Assembly has made an exception for counties that have the same population as Grundy County.

After legal review and considering the option to challenge the tax in court, it was decided there would be little to gain by pursuing litigation. Going forward, future rental reservations will be subject to a 5 percent Grundy county "hotel" tax, 5 percent Town of Monteagle "hotel" tax, and a 9.25 percent Tennessee state sales tax, for a total of 19.25 percent tax on the base rental.
