Lawn trimmings are collected on Wednesdays.

Dogs must be registered, including proof of rabies vaccination. Pick up after your pets.


SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATES FROM MS. PAM

WEEK 3 PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS

MONDAY

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Beatrix Farrand's Garden at Bellefield," with Anne Cleves Symmes: Beatrix Farrand was a land-scape gardener whose work defined the American taste in gardens throughout the first half of the 20th century. Farrand joined the likes of England's Gertrude Jekyll and William Robinson in championing the use of perennial plants in combinations based upon color harmony, bloom sequence, and texture. This was the birth of the mixed border that is standard in gardens today.

1-4:00 pm, Pulliam Center: Women's Workshop, "A Little Me Time," with Liz Norell: You know you want more for your life. You know there's a part of you that's yearning for more meaningful work, stronger relationships, or an easier way of moving through the world. You're just not sure HOW to make this happen. If this sounds familiar, this workshop is designed to help you reconnect to the truest parts of yourself, the things that are often buried under endless to-do lists and task-mastering. Expect to spend time journaling, participating in meditation/visualization, sharing with others, and laughing.

8:15 pm, Warren Chapel: Beatrix Farrand's American Landscapes (2019) documentary:, with an introduction + Q&A with director/writer Stephen Ives and writer Anne Cleves Symmes: This new documentary follows award-winning public garden designer Lynden B. Miller as she sets off to explore the remarkable life and career of America's first female landscape architect—Beatrix Farrand. Although she created gardens for the rich and powerful, including John D. Rockefeller, Jr., J.P. Morgan, and President Woodrow Wilson, she also was an early advocate for the value of public gardens and believed strongly in the power of the natural world to make people's lives better.

TUESDAY

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "If the Church Were Christian: Belief & Behavior," with Philip Gulley: Many Christians are those who have been involved in the church yet see few similarities between the church's life and the person of Jesus. They sometimes ask, "Is this really what Jesus called us to do?" These people respect Jesus, but question what Christianity has become. Gulley explores how the church has lost its way. This eye-opening examination of the values of Jesus reveals the extent to which the church has drifted from the teachings of the man who inspired its creation.

WEDNESDAY

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Unlearning God: How Unbelieving Helped Me Believe," with Philip Gulley: Most of us grow up

taking in whole belief systems without much thought, only to discover later that what we received as being certain is actually nothing like it. And then we're faced with a choice—retreat to spiritual security and the community that comes with it, or strike out into the unknown. Gulley serves as just the spiritual director a wayward pilgrim could warm to.

THURSDAY

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "The Awakened Soul," with Philip Gulley: Abraham Maslow coined the term self-actualization and said that when someone was self-actualized, they were living at their utmost capacity, at the height of their creativity. What Gulley invites in this talk is a careful look at the characteristics of self-actualized people, doing so through the lens of the Spirit, since that is how we view the world. Instead of using the term self-actualized, he instead talks about having an awakened soul.

8:15 pm, Warren Chapel: "Honoring the Historic: Lessons from a Career Dedicated to Protecting a Sense of Place," with Patrick McIntyre: Since 2007, McIntyre has served as Tennessee's State Historic Preservation Officer and the executive director of the Tennessee Historical Commission (THC), the state agency responsible for the preservation and interpretation of Tennessee's historic and cultural heritage, including 17 state historic sites. In this role, he has emphasized the state historic sites program and worked for increased funding for preservation in the state. In 2013 the new Civil War Sites Protection Fund was created, which to date has provided nearly \$4 million in matching funds to save historic battlefield properties.

FRIDAY

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Caves of South Cumberland," with John Hickman & Jeffrey Reynolds: Jeff Reynolds started walking into Tennessee caves in the 1950s as a child. He began vertical caving in the 1980s, which opened some truly lovely spaces, some infrequently visited. At this lecture, you'll see Jeff's photos and hear John's and Jeff's stories of exploring these awe-inspiring spaces.

8:00 pm, Auditorium: Bluebird Originals Singer-Songwriter Foursome: There are not many nights you can walk into a room and hear 30 plus years of American musical history all in one performance. Thom Schuyler, Tony Arata, J. Fred Knobloch, and Jelly Roll Johnson bring you that kind of night. With more than 100 million records sold during their careers as Nashville songwriters, Schuyler, Arata, and Knobloch continue to be a creative force on Nashville's Music Row. Kirk 'Jelly Roll" Johnson has appeared on more than 100 Top Ten country releases as one of the most in-demand harmonica players in Nashville.
