- With books in hand, take an index cards or Post-It note & pen. Use these to neatly print the inscription you wish the author to write in your book.
- With your books and inscription requests, a Platform staff member or volunteer will invite you to the signing line. These staff will ensure your book is open to the correct page for our authors. They will lead you to the author for the signing.

This process has been designed in coordination with our guests to ensure they can wrap up the book signing in a timely fashion and get everyone on their way at a reasonable hour.

Shop local at the Thursday Morning Mountain Market, 7-10:00 am, in front of Harton Hall.

Trash pick-up in week 4 will be on Monday, July 1st (regular date) and Friday, July 5th (rescheduled date).

Call Scott First! Home repairs/ upgrades are generally not permitted during the season. Contact the General Manager before calling a contractor.

Auto permits must be displayed at all times, else a ticket may be issued.

Box lunches and other reservations-required dining events must be paid at the main office; dining hall staff do not accept reservations or payment.

ALL golf carts must be registered (or re-registered) to receive the 2019 decal. Only licensed drivers are legally allowed to drive carts.

Dogs must be registered, including proof of rabies vaccination. Pick up after your pets.

But once they got here, the couple looked at each other and mused, "Why would we leave?"

Jim says that since they arrived, their two teenagers have all but disappeared: "We never see them." They have relished the activities, from returning from caving caked in mud (see photo) to a scavenger hunt that required splashing a lifeguard and delivering water to the gatekeepers. Other highlights for their kids? Catching (and releasing) crawfish under the Troll Bridge every morning, to the point that they have a password to cross the Troll Bridge (hint: it's "EAT CRAWFISH!"). Building approximately 1 million (give or take) fairy castles with moss. Going to story time on Winfield Porch, where Boomer was thoroughly charmed by the little snack cups filled with gummies and cheese. Pulling snails off trees. Catching fireflies nightly.

The smiles on Jim's and Cappi's faces as they recount these joys are a testament to how much their family has enjoyed their time here. In summers past, the family has spent time at High Hampton in Cashiers, N.C., where they could count on about one activity a day for the kids. "There, we're our own cruise directors," Jim says. When Cappi joins the conversation, she quickly echoes this sentiment by saying, "We get a vacation because we're not the camp directors here!"

Asked to share a moment from their week that encapsulates what they discovered in Monteagle, each thinks carefully.


For Jim, it was when he was driving their rented golf cart back from the pool one day, only to be waved down by a woman on the corner. She was heading to the Woman's Association and wondered if he could give her a ride? She hopped into the cart and for the one-minute drive, they became fast friends. Why this? "Everyone is all here together," he says. "The people around us are so friendly."

Cappi shares the story of the evening they—along with their family members, including Molly (whose picture appeared on page 1)—loaded the pajama-wearing kids up into their golf carts and

drove to Warren's Point to catch a sunset. "The gazebo out there feels like the *Sound of Music*," she says. "It's a step back in time. It's *so* pro-family, a place to nurture family. We've found time we never get." (The top right photo is from that gorgeous night.)

Cappi goes on, "One night, I laid down in bed with my daughter. We opened the window and watched the fireflies for 20 minutes. This time has helped our family slow down and focus on each other."

They're already planning their trip next year. In the meantime, Little Cappy has asked if they can take all the Assembly dogs home when they leave Sunday.

WEEK 4 PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS

MONDAY

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Women's Justice Initiative," with Kate Flatley: A lifelong Assembly attendee, Kate Flatley attended law school at the University of Virginia and has 15 years' experience developing and implementing projects in the fields of women's rights, access to justice, and public health. She founded and serves as executive director of the Women's Justice Initiative, an organization that improves the lives of rural Guatemalan women and girls through legal empowerment, women's rights education, and gender-based violence prevention.

8:15 pm, Warren Chapel: *Call of the Forest: The Forgotten Wisdom of Trees* (2016) documentary:, with an introduction + Q&A with Dr. Karen Kuers: The science and enchantment of the global forest provides us with answers to modern dilemmas.

TUESDAY

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "If The Forest Around Us: The 2018 Inventory, Assessment, & Recommendations of the Assembly's Trees," with Dr. Karen Kuers: Sewanee's Annie B. Snowden Professor of Forestry, Kuers will describe the results of last summer's study of the MSSA grounds' tree population. Her academic and research interests focus on the ecology and management of upland forests and forested urban ecosystems, and she has a special interest in traditional uses of forest and urban plant species for food and medicine. She began collaborating with the MSSA in 1995, when she and Professor Scott Torreano performed the first MSSA Commons Tree Inventory & Assessment. For those interested in learning more, Kuers will lead a guided walk among the Assembly's trees, departing from Warren Chapel at 2:30 pm Tuesday.

8:15 pm, Warren Chapel: The Soul of America, with Jon Meacham: Pulitzer Prize-winning author, presidential historian, and Sewanee alum Jon Meacham will lecture on The Soul of America, based on his New York Times bestseller of the same name. Meacham's book looks at the current political climate through the context of other critical times in United States history when hope overcame division and fear. He contributes to TIME magazine and The New York Times Book Review, in addition to being a frequent guest on MSNBC's Morning Joe. He previously served as editor at Newsweek and is currently working on a biography of James and Dolley Madison. A book sale and signing will follow his lecture (see page 2).

WEDNESDAY

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Healing Children: Stories from the

Frontiers of Pediatric Medicine," with Dr. Kurt Newman: Kurt Newman MD is president and CEO of Children's National Medical Center in Washington, DC, widely recognized as one of the nation's best pediatric hospitals. He has been a surgeon there for more than 30 years and is a professor of surgery and pediatrics at the George Washington University School of Medicine & Health Sciences. He helped create the Sheikh Zayed Institute for Pediatric Surgical Innovation, dedicated to making children's surgery pain-free and less invasive. His lecture is drawn from his published book of the same name.

FRIDAY

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Our Experience with Family Legacy in Zambia," with Bessie & William Doffermyre: In July 2018, Bessie and her 8-year-old son William traveled on a mission trip to Zambia, which has the highest per capita orphan rate in the world. Through "Family Legacy," a faith-based nonprofit in Dallas, Bessie and William were paired with 10 middle-school-aged Zambian orphans to mentor and teach the Gospel over the course of seven days. On their return home, the duo recruited friends and family to fund scholarships for uniforms, supplies, and tuition through their high school graduation.

8:15 pm, Warren Chapel: An Evening with Hampton Sides:: Nonfiction author Hampton Sides is best known for his adventure stories set in times of war or depicting epic expeditions of discovery and exploration. His bestselling histories include *Ghost Soldiers; Blood and Thunder*, and his most recent, *In the Kingdom of Ice*, recounting the heroic polar voyage of the U.S.S. Jeannette during the Gilded Age. Several of his books have been turned into films; *Blood and Thunder*, about Kit Carson, is currently under development for the screen. A book sale and signing will follow his lecture (see page 2).
