WEEK 6 PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS

MONDAY

8:15 pm, Warren Chapel: Freedom Riders (2010) documentary:, with an introduction + Q&A with Dr. John Willis: Freedom Riders is the powerful, harrowing, and ultimately inspirational story of six months in 1961 that changed America forever. From May until November 1961, more than 400 black and white Americans risked their lives for simply traveling together on buses and trains as they journeyed through the Deep South. Deliberately violating Jim Crow laws in order to test and challenge a segregated interstate travel system, the Freedom Riders met with bitter racism and mob violence along the way, testing their belief in nonviolent activism.

TUESDAY

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "A Community in Black & White: A Story of Family, Photography, & Community," with Joseph Shipp & Chuck Reece: As editor and co-founder of *The Bitter Southerner*, Reece and his partners set out to tell stories of a new (er) south. Partnering with Shipp, a photographer with roots in small-town Tennessee, The Bitter Southerner published its first book, *A Community in Black & White* in 2018. In this lecture, Shipp and Reece will talk about that project.

8:15 pm, Warren Chapel: "Hands Across Place, Time, & Race," with Jane Dalrymple-Hollo, Fred Clark, & Dr. John Willis: This conversation will focus on the relationships forged in Mississippi that connect Dalrymple-Hollo and Clark, who was a freedom rider in the early 1960s. Sewanee history professor Willis, who specializes in southern culture and history, will join them to provide historical context.

She is in the process of designing and building a set of paraments for a church in Kissing, Germany, in addition to volunteering as a sacristan for Trinity Lutheran Church in Tullahoma.
