# A HISTORY OF MOSES ROCK

The Moses Rock Spring, housed in an old stone structure in an area called Moses Rock Park, was the original source of water for the visitors and animals of the Assembly in the 1800s. In 2007, to commemorate the 125th year of existence of the Monteagle Sunday School Assembly, longtime resident Aileen O'Brien created the idea of a water feature



and garden on a previously neglected hillside, which could be enjoyed by children at play and enhance the greenspace. D.J. Giles from Lookout Mountain created the water feature and Aileen developed the landscaping. Mrs. Ruth Grace Jervis provided the funding as a memorial to her husband, Wayne Talmage Jervis.

A year was spent developing the project. Water pours out from under a rock and splashes into a "pondless" basin with water- loving native plants. A gazebo, stone tables and benches provide a shady place to enjoy the sounds of falling water. Plants along the water feature include ferns, roses, junipers, hostas, azaleas, rhododendron, iris, columbine, and daylilies, just to name a few.

Another garden at the Assembly designed and cared for with love ... a gift for the ages. Be sure to stop by and enjoy it before you head home for the season!

#### **QUICK BITES**

Shop local at the Thursday Morning Mountain Market, 7-10:00 am, in front of Harton Hall.

Call Scott First! Home repairs/ upgrades are generally not permitted during the season. Contact the General Manager before calling a contractor.

Auto permits must be displayed at all times, else a ticket may be issued.

Gate tickets (or wristbands) should be on your person at all times.

Set up a Harton Hall account for cash-free dining all season long.

Box lunches and other reservations-required dining events must be paid at the main office; dining hall staff do not accept reservations or payment.

Save time at the gate and preorder your tickets by calling (931) 924-2286. You can also preorder online.

ALL golf carts must be registered (or re-registered) to receive the 2019 decal. Only licensed drivers are legally allowed to drive carts.

Lawn trimmings are collected on Wednesdays.

**Dogs** must be registered, including proof of rabies vaccination. Pick up after your pets.

Quiet Hour is daily from 1:00-2:30 pm. Children should be indoors at their cottages. Tennis is only permitted on the East Gate courts. No deliveries during this time.

3:00 pm, Warren Chapel: *They Shall Not Grow Old* (2018; 99 min), with introduction + Q&A with Jamil Zainaldin: Using state-of-the-art technology and materials from the BBC and Imperial War Museum, filmmaker Peter Jackson allows the story of World War I to be told by the men who were there. Life on the front is explored through the voices of the soldiers, who discuss their feelings about the conflict, the food they ate, the friends they made and their dreams of the future.

She has been an actor and director in Atlanta since 1973, working primarily at the Alliance Theater. In October 2015, she received the Georgia Governor's Award for the Arts and Humanities.
