## Platform Highlights

These are exciting days in the Platform office. A few, last details are being tracked down for inclusion in the Program Book for the 138th Platform. The schedule, workshop descriptions, lecture titles, and adventures of all sorts begin to create an exciting picture of what the summer will bring. No two summers are alike, and this year brings a few changes brought about by both opportunity and suggestions.

There are two new activities for our younger members. Dance classes were suggested last summer, and a new swim instructor is also a dancer, with experience teaching both swim and dance to young children (and, loves to do this). Each Friday, just after rest time the Eaglets and Eagles, will be offered dance classes. The emphasis is on learning the steps but working with friends to use the steps to create their own dance to music that is appealing to them. BirdieBall Golf will also be offered to the younger ones on Mondays or Wednesdays throughout the season. BirdieBall is called the “revolutionary limited flight” golf practice that has been adapted to fun games for younger people while learning the foundations of the sport.

Adult morning exercise has received scheduling changes in response to the many requests for greater variety of both teachers and activities. Each week will include two Zumba sessions, two yoga sessions, and (thank you Eleanor Montgomery) *Pilates Friday*. There are four different yoga instructors and two Zumba instructors who will rotate through the season. The pool schedule has been extended to full, eight week sessions of both aquatic fitness and aquatic stretch (yoga). Fitness will take place three days a week on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, and slow stretches on Tuesdays and Thursdays.



The Writer's Grove will offer a weekly time of readings and writings throughout the season. Readings will include William Faulkner and Margaret Renkl; topics of Women's Suffrage and Sustainability; and readers from the MSSA membership, some reading their own works.

The beginner bridge class is taking a year off, and the advanced instructor has promised his wife that he will do a better job at being retired in the summer. With assistance from previous instructors and a couple of current bridge players, we are delighted to welcome Marilyn Shelton to the Assembly this summer. Marilyn is a gold life master and author of four bridge books geared for tournament play and serious bridge students. She has coached and taught advanced

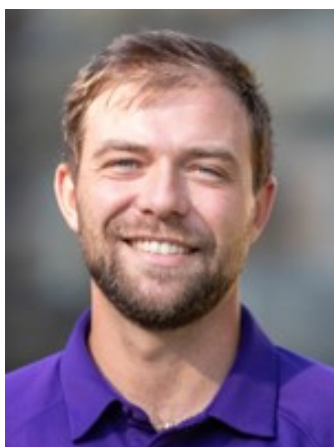

bridge for 15 years. *Hand Evaluation* (a class handout) addresses Losing trick count and Klinger count. A companion book, *Third and Fourth Seat Bidding*, treats subjects that are often misunderstood: psychs, light openers and pass out theory. Lessons passed down by two West Coast Grand Masters were used to build her last books on notrump and 2/1 systems.

She worked as a systems analyst at Lockheed Missiles and Spacecraft Center tracking satellites, and at the Boeing Company as a system designer and management educator. In her spare time, she published 4 fiction books, taught 9<sup>th</sup> grade, and lives with her husband and cat, Pepper, in Chattanooga. Planning a renovation project? The Architectural Review Committee will accept projects for review and recommendation to the Board of Trust for approval four times per year. Questions about possible projects, the process, and necessary requirements should be referred to the General Manager. Projects submitted by the following dates will be reviewed and presented at the board meeting following the submission.

June 10 July 31 September 30

January 15 February 28

The ARC is available throughout the year to advise members on their project planning prior to submission of a request. Not sure if you need ARC approval? Check with the General Manager first.

He was a lifelong Nashvillian and was educated at Robertson Academy, Montgomery Bell Academy, McCallie School and Vanderbilt University (1953) where he graduated Cum Laude with a BA in Business and a Minor in English. He served in the US Navy in Norfolk, Virginia, before returning to Nashville to work in the family business, Farris Hardwood Lumber Company and later Central Oak Products flooring company.

He was an active member of First Presbyterian Church. He fulfilled his life-long passion in 1971 when he became a full-time farmer on Beech Creek Farm. He spent 35 years serving displaced people in Soroti, Uganda following the overthrow of Idi Amin in 1980.

In 1986 he purchased a new farm in Robertson County and developed the first certified organic grain farm in the state of Tennessee and named it Windy Acres Farm. He successfully and legally protected this farm from development through The Land Trust for Tennessee and in addition, preserved the farm for next generation farmers with the help of the Agrarian Trust. He loved farming and working with his hands and at the same time was a gentleman and a scholar with a heart for social justice and the poor.
