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

### **In Our Prayers**



Livingfield More, 94, left this world having lived a full, blessed and productive life persevering through and enduring a lengthy illness. He was disciplined, welleducated, well-read and never pretentious or ostentatious. Born to native Nashville parents, E. Livingfield More (1868-1934) and Ellen Stokes (1895-2001) in July of 1926, Livingfield More was a gentleman and a scholar. He graduated from Vanderbilt Law School in 1952 and passed the Bar Exam shortly thereafter. He was proud to be presented to the Supreme Court of Tennessee in 1953 and even prouder to find that his law degree was converted to a JD several decades later. He joined

the Army to fight in WWII. He met the love of his life, Agnes Stokes Fort of Nashville, in 1952 and they married in 1957. They had a daughter and two grandchildren. They devoted their lives to each other and their families, River Grange farm and the Arcade in downtown Nashville until she was tragically taken from him in 2011. He was a member of the Society of the Cincinnati, the Phi Delta Theta fraternity at Vanderbilt University, the Belle Meade Country Club and the Williamson County Co-Op. He took part in the founding of Harpeth Academy in Franklin, TN which eventually became part of BGA. He also was a founding member and continued to be a staunch supporter of St. Dunstan's Anglican Church, now Holy Cross Anglican Church. He is survived by his daughter, Ellen Livingfield More, and two grandchildren, Stokes Dunavan and Nicholson Dunavan. Planning a renovation project? The Architectural Review Committee will accept projects for review and recommendation to the Board of Trust for approval four times per year. Questions about possible projects, the process, and necessary requirements should be referred to the General Manager. Projects submitted by the following dates will be reviewed and presented at the board meeting following the submission.

February 28 June 10 July 31
September 30 January 15
The ARC is available throughout the year to advise members on their project planning prior to submission of a request. Not sure if you need ARC approval? Check with the General Manager first.

## New Member Spotlight: Helen Donelson and

### **Wayne Brafford**

Wedding bells rang for Helen and Wayne in November, 2019. They had dreams of traveling and spending time with their families, but that came to an abrupt halt with the pandemic. They were disappointed but decided to look at it as an extended honeymoon. In the fall of 2020, they heard about a cottage for sale in the Assembly around the corner from her sisters, Milly Huffman and Virginia Curry, and weeks later, they were the new owners of Rendezvous.

Helen grew up in Memphis and has never missed a summer in Monteagle, staying with her grandparents, Virginia and Percy Parker, at Summer Oaks. After living in Atlanta, Memphis and Austin, Helen returned to Memphis to be with her daughters, son-in-law, and five grandchildren. She and Wayne were married and she later retired her Dyslexia Therapy private practice.

Wayne grew up in Raleigh and Charlotte, NC. He graduated with a degree in Engineering in Pulp and Paper and enjoyed a long and successful career in the paper industry. After his job moved him all over the country, he and his family settled in Memphis, and 11 years ago, he retired from International Paper as a Senior Executive. Wayne has three sons, two daughters-in-law, and four grandchildren.

Helen shared some memories that will sound familiar to anyone who grew up coming to Monteagle: "I remember waking up early to find my Papa (Percy Parker) on the porch, drinking instant coffee and working a puzzle. We would come home from games for 'dinner' which included homemade bread and wild blueberry pie prepared by Louise, a dear mountain cook. My mother,

Ginger Donelson, always made us observe quiet hour after dinner, but when the bell rang, my sisters and I were off to the pool or crafts. After supper, my sisters and I would head to the movies, our gate ticket dangling from a lanyard made in crafts. I was always a little nervous about the bats flying around the theater but mesmerized by them, too. I had my first kiss in Monteagle, sitting on the Pool Bridge and 'supervised' by one of my friends. My father, Frank Donelson, taught me how to swim and dive in Monteagle and spent hours with me on the tennis courts."

She continued, "As I moved from city to city as an adult, I always returned to Monteagle, sharing with my daughters the joys of the Mountain. And now, Wayne and I look forward to doing the same with our grandchildren."
