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From the President A New Task Force on **Community** Relations


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Like any church, the Monteagle Sunday School Assembly has a responsibility both to its members and to its surrounding community. With this responsibility in mind, the board has appointed a task force to study how the Assembly can more effectively reach out and engage with others who live outside the Assembly grounds and who enjoy alongside us the beautiful Cumberland Plateau. Greg Maloof has agreed to chair the Task Force, and the members are Ann Ewing, Ed Provost, Will Reynolds and Mark Riley.

The task force will be looking at the many different ways we currently engage with the community through our Education and Outreach Committees and at new ways we might increase our engagement and strengthen our ties with the city of Monteagle and others on the Plateau. The task force will also be responsible for making recommendations to the board as to how the Assembly should respond to particular issues that might arise outside the gates



that could affect the Assembly.

The community issue currently at the forefront of most peoples' minds is likely the proposed TA/Petro truck stop in Monteagle. As you probably know, there are very strong feelings on both sides of this issue. Many who live in Monteagle are concerned with attracting good paying jobs to the Plateau. Others in the community are equally concerned about the effect the truck stop could have on the environment, the tranquility, and the livability of beautiful Monteagle. Because reasonable people on both sides of this issue hold different views, and because it is important for the Assembly to maintain a good relationship with all our neighbors, both the board and the task force concluded that the Assembly should not take a position. This is not to say however, that we are asking individual members of the Assembly not to weigh in and make their views (continued on page 2)

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known to the decision-makers in Monteagle. That is, of course, how a good democracy works, and we do have year-round residents who feel especially connected to the community and what happens to the town.

All of the 2020 participants were invited to return either this year or in 2022, and there were already some guests scheduled for this year. Thanks to recommend –ations made by members, we have a rich program of lectures and activities to form a complete program.

Highlights of the Thursday night lectures include:

Katharine Wilkinson who will speak on her most recent book, *Saving All That We Can.*

English journalist and author Alex Kershaw will present book talks on two of his works, *The Liberator* and *The First Wave*, both telling stories of the men and women of the Allied forces in World War II.

Dr. Spencer Crew, interim director of the National Museum of African American History and Culture, and founder of the Underground Railroad Museum, will speak on the Underground Railroad.

ARC PROJECT SUBMISSION DEADLINES

Planning a renovation project? The Architectural Review Committee will accept projects for review and recommendation to the Board of Trust for approval four times per year. Questions about possible projects, the process, and necessary requirements should be referred to the General Manager. Projects submitted by the following dates will be reviewed and presented at the board meeting following the submission.

June 10 July 31 September 30 January 15 February 28

The ARC is available throughout the year to advise members on their project planning prior to submission of a request. Not sure if you need ARC approval? Check with the General Manager first.
