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A New Look for Twilight Prayers

In response to a Caucus recommendation in 2019, the Twilight Prayer service has been given much thought through many conversations. The recommendation was that the Platform Superintendent find a way to include a wider variety of music in the evening prayer service.

Three topics were addressed: the time, format, and music. The service format and music have been addressed first with the reasoning that an unappealing service will not be attended by many regardless of the time of day. The service should be kept brief, participatory, and involve people of all ages. It will be composed of regular content of scripture, prayer, and song gathered from many traditions. Our hope is to offer a simple service that will draw the community together to

give thanks for the blessings of the day.

A seminarian who was to work with the platform last year compiled a booklet that could be used by those attending the service. This would allow an adult to help a young person follow the reading of the psalm or the text of the hymn. This year, more variety has been created by increasing the number of booklets to rotate through the season. Since the Jervis Bible Week is a study of Luke, we have suggested the use of passages from the Gospel each night.

Music will have a weekly framework that provides opportunities for jazz, Americana-folk, Renaissance choral music, instrumental offerings, and (continued on page 2)

hymns from many denominations. Each Monday night will feature music from the Taizé community, an ecumenical Christian order founded in 1940 in Burgundy, France. Today they welcome over 100,000 visitors each year who wish to experience worship in the Church of Reconciliation where the music is an integral part of the contemplative services. The music, composed by musicians of the community, represents their international members in the use of many languages, short phrases repeated as a mantra, sometimes with a soloist or instruments adding embellishments. Each Wednesday service will be accompanied by Bea Troxel on guitar, and she will introduce the songs for that evening during a fifteen-minute extended prelude starting at 7:15 p.m.

We also sought ways to more actively involve others in the service. Young ones will be invited to ring the bell for chapel on their birthday (or the day of the month of their birthday if it is not in the season). Thursday evenings will include special prayers for all those celebrating anniversaries or birthdays. (Stay tuned to find out how those names will be gathered) The intergenerational chime choir will play each Thursday and several musicians performing a Tuesday night concert will play a prelude or accompany the service.

The guest clergy have been provided the information and we will coordinate with them each week to prepare a prayerful conclusion to our day Monday through Thursday. Come with a full and thankful heart to join in a community time of song and prayer.

Riley Burnette Projectionist Riley hails from Monteagle, TN. She goes to St. Andrew's- Sewanee where she partakes in soccer,




