UPDATE FROM THE CAMPUS MASTER PLANNING TASK FORCE

Several months ago we shared with you a new exciting task force created to help guide the Campus Master Planning process. We have worked over the off-season to learn from our most senior generation via interviews about their earliest memories and experiences in Assembly life. While the memories didn't necessarily focus on a building or place in and of itself, we did clearly see the importance of "community" over the years. We also have held focus groups with current and past Presidents and Committee Chairs. At the last Town Hall we introduced the Campus master plan concept in person for the first time and began gathering ideas. Outlined below are some FAQs that will help share our vision of the planning process.

What is a Campus Master Plan? The Campus Master Plan will distill ideas gathered from the members into a viable plan for long term uses of our property and facilities to support the mission of the Assembly. When we say long term, we really mean long term – thinking 30-50 years ahead. The newness of this venture cannot be stressed enough. The Task Force expects the entire process to last at least 3 years and we are still at the beginning. The most important thing right now is to gather as much input as possible from all constituents.

Is this the same thing as the Strategic Plan? No, the two plans are different even though they sound alike. A Strategic Plan is a plan that covers a 5-10 year period and focuses on an overall strategy to carry out the mission over the next 5-10 years. The Campus Master Plan is focused on a longer time period and only on the use of property and facilities.

What is in scope for the Campus Master Plan? Since the Campus Master Plan is focused on grounds and facilities, we are asking everyone to think beyond our current "campus" to include the grounds inside the gates, the recently acquired properties outside the gates and even additional contiguous properties that may become available and then focus on use of those properties in ways that support the mission of the Assembly in the future. This process is about maintaining our rich history, but envisioning a future that will sustain us for decades in the future.

What types of ideas are NOT in scope of the Campus Master Plan? Since the Campus Master Plan focuses on ground and facilities, we are not including ideas that are subject to implementation in the short-term term as a part of the work of the standing committees or even ideas that are better suited to a Strategic Plan. Any ideas that fall into those areas will be shared with the relevant committees.

What sorts of ideas have you heard so far? For ease of tracking we have asked people to think of ideas along the lines of Religion/Chapel; Education/Platform; Recreation and Future Initiatives. We used these topics in the discussion at the last Town Hall and gathered ideas on "boards" for each of these topics. We have received very creative ideas that range from:

- Expanded housing options to include smaller homes either for young couples starting out or members who need single floor living with accessibility features;
- Multi-use event space near the bluff which could be used for gatherings, weddings, programming;
- Recreation Pavilion for multi-use activities, including lectures, church etc;
- Several ideas from either early plans for the Assembly campus or actual facilities that no longer exist. For example, a small lake was identified in early plans, but not executed. Likewise, there used to be a bowling alley on the grounds.

So what's next? We will do a short presentation at the next Town Hall (on July 24) to continue the discussion. Additionally, a Task Force Member will be in the dining hall each day the following week to continue the discussion and answer questions.

As noted, the Task Force remains in its "gathering" phase. No idea is too big or too small to be considered at this point. We encourage members to not be constrained by the current gates/fences but to envision the all Assembly-owned property as the "campus".

We will continue the information gathering over the next year through additional focus groups and surveys and, hopefully, by next season we will see the outlines of what the Master Plan will look like. The outline will be further defined over the following year. The final Master Plan will be vetted for feasibility and, ultimately, approved by the Board and Membership.

It is our fervent hope that this process will lead to the best use of Assembly grounds and facilities, encourage communal gatherings, and further the mission

If you've been in the Snack Shop this season you've seen how fun it is. If you haven't been in yet please stop by!


Don't forget to sign up for the Foosball tournament coming up July 17th! You'll want to take home the championship trophy.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

This is a photograph of Eleanor Lanier Waldrop, her grandmother, Jeannie Sartain, and her brother John Lanier in Monteagle, near the train station in 1909. In her oral history, recorded in 2001, at the age of 95 she recalled the following, "I was walking along the road east of the Assembly with my nurse to pick blueberries on a sunny afternoon. I was about five years old. I can feel the sun on my face even now."



FROM THE SMITH-BOETH MONARCH WAYSTATION

In the Smith-Boeth Monarch Waystation this week, the development of the Black Swallowtail caterpillars continued and impelled them on to their next important phase, finding a hiding place and changing into a chrysalis. After fattening up on fennel, the three caterpillars, now named Tom, Dick, and Harry, left their host plant and skedaddled to other random greenery on which to transform themselves. Two were followed to their destinations, and one escaped undetected. Harry was seen as he contorted and spun silk to bind himself to the stem of the plant he had chosen. Over the next 24 hours, he changed into a gorgeous green chrysalis, perfectly camouflaged, a state in which he will remain for the next 10-12 days.

Tom's chosen stalk was more exposed, so a milk crate was placed around him to protect him from birds. Photographing through the sides of the crate, we saw that he too had changed into a green jewel, hopefully safely on the way to becoming a butterfly. Next week, God willing, we hope to share that news.

Other rare visitors came to the garden as well. The long-nosed and aptly named American Snout posed on a garden stake. And one of the rare visitors, the Zebra Swallowtail, which happens to be the state butterfly, arrived for the longest visit the garden has ever enjoyed.

We will be back next week to report on the next adventures of Tom and Harry, and Dick too, if we ever find him.



Golf cart parking at Warren Chapel is for the benefit of those who need mobility assistance. Please do not move carts during services or programs.

Golf carts shall be operated only on roadways with an exception for medical reasons or handicapped condition of the operator or passengers when carts may be operated on walkways and paths.

All golf carts must be equipped with a horn and must have front lights and rear lights or reflectors if driven after daylight hours.

LC Fiore, One Little Span of Earth: German POW's & the Creating of Abbo's Alley, Sewanee

At its peak in 1943, Camp Forrest, outside Tullahoma, TN, housed some 24,000 German POWs. These captured soldiers labored in nearby farms and worksites including Sewanee, where they contributed to the creation of a beloved University landmark: Abbo's Alley. L.C. Fiore will discuss the history of Camp Forrest; the historical person of visionary professor Abbot Cotten Martin; and read from his story "The Trench Garden" (Ploughshares, 2014), which reimagines the clearing of Abbo's Alley during WWII and what it must have been like for students to work alongside hardened, foreign Prisoners of War. Fiore's novel *The Last Great American Magic* won Novel of the Year from Underground Book Reviews. His debut novel, *Green Gospel* (Livingston Press), was named First Runner-Up in the Eric Hoffer Book Awards; short-listed for the Balcones Fiction Prize; and long-listed for the Crook's Corner Book Prize. Fiore received an M.A. from Northwestern University and is a graduate of The University of the South,'00. He is the communications director for the North Carolina Writers' Network and lives in Chapel Hill, N.C. Mary Priestly, curator of the Sewanee Herbarium will join Fiore on a guided walk of Abbo's Alley Tues., July 20, to tell stories and learn about the flora and fauna in the wood path. In this workshop, students will learn to make prints using the cyanotype process. This early photographic process creates a unique blur image. It was historically used by architects and engineers to make copies of their drawings, or as we call them, "blue-prints." The images that students will produce in this workshop will look different than the photographs we are used to seeing. Students will search the grounds for natural materials that have unique shapes and varying degrees of transparency-such as leaves, rocks, grass, etc.-and create 5 x 7 inch prints with the objects they have found.
