# FROM THE SMITH-BOETH MONARCH WAYSTATION

TAM, A FEMALE BLACK SWALLOWTAIL, IS BORN!

Tam, formerly known as Tom, was born in the garden last week, closing out this cycle of Black Swallowtail excitement. In the photo, a shaft of sunlight is illuminating the empty chrysalis next to her from which she had emerged moments before.

Late July is the time when the Monarchs migrating south lay their eggs for the next brood that will pick up the journey towards their wintering spot in Mexico. We have been swarmed with many Eastern Tiger Swallowtails, Spicebush Swallow-tails, and Silver-Spotted Skippers, but so far we have not had any more Monarchs. Next week we hope to report good news.

Amusingly, we had an insect faceoff between a female Diana Fritillary and a Japanese beetle on the Butterfly Bush. The beetle, which rightfully was there first, took umbrage to the butterfly landing on what it seemingly thought to be its personal flower. Repeatedly, the beetle rose on its hind legs and waved in protest.

On Tuesday the 27<sup>th</sup>, Dr. Stephanie Smith and Rick Boeth led a Butterfly Walk and Talk , which began with a slideshow in the auditorium, to the garden. The weather was hot but good for butterflies and even a Hummingbird Moth, along with a tiny Pearl Crescent on a yellow coneflower. I hope everyone has enjoyed our Chapel offerings this season. The Assembly provides a wonderful opportunity for Christians from different places and traditions to come together and worship. This diversity allows this place to develop its own unique traditions of worship that might not happen anywhere else. Learning about these traditions, while imagining fresh ideas to intentionally develop our Chapel services in new ways, has been a wonderful experience. I feel so fortunate to share in these memories over the summer: the Candlelight Service on the Fourth of July, the Animal Blessing, Bible Week lectures, Twilight Prayers, Thursday Morning Prayers, Adult Bible Study, Sunday School on the Porch, along with hymns, the Monteagle Benediction, Harmony Bell Ringers, Youth Week, and countless opportunities for our youth to gather and grow together in Christ. So many of you have shared memories from the past, and have been gracious in discovering our fresh offerings this summer. Our visiting preachers shaped our time together on Sunday mornings, at discussions in the Writer's Grove, with reflections at Twilight Prayers, and hopefully meaningful fellowship between scheduled services. We carried on the services and traditions that I listed above. We also developed an order of service for Twilight Prayers, and invited guest musicians to share musical traditions, like Taize, that are new to the Assembly. A lot of work goes into coordinating the parties that work to make these things happen, and I have found it very rewarding. I must share my gratitude to the Chapel Committee Chair and Volunteers, our Chapel Chancellor, and to all of you for helping us hold true to the past while we move into the future. After a long year not being able to gather, it has been wonderful to worship together again.


