# Campus Master Planning Update

First, we want to thank everyone who participated during the season by providing input into the master planning process. The task force presented at two town halls, the annual meeting, and an open house, and task force members were present in the dining hall for a week during the season to meet with Assembly members.

The information requested during these events aligned with the Chautauqua pillars and some of our own unique needs-recreation, education/platform, future initiatives, youth and religion. The suggestions and feedback fell into several main topic areas:

Recreation

Facility/pavilion to accommodate growth in current recreation options along with new recreational opportunities (comments included references to pickleball/tennis courts, bocce ball, indoor options; fitness facilities

Use of green space/expanded trail system/camping option with opportunity for community use

Education/Platform Community-centric service project Housing for speakers

Future Initiatives

Multi-use facility for gathering and entertaining – notably at the bluff area Housing options – ranging from retirement, single-level, smaller, more affordable options both inside and outside the current gates, and a boarding/inn type lodging that provides daily housing options which are a part of the MSSA heritage

Youth Youth meeting facility/outing center

Religion
Facility for possible year round minister

In discussing these topics, the task force considered the layout of the main MSSA campus and the activity hub stretching from the pool/pickleball courts to the Mall area. This highlighted the "magic" or synergy created by activities in a central area/hub. It was likened to everyone at a party congregating in the kitchen!

We met with Judson Newbern in November to review the work to date. Judson led campus planning at Vanderbilt University for 30 years and affirmed the hub concept as a key part of successful master planning. He also noted that the Assembly should continue to look at steps to remediate noise at the current pickleball location while the Campus Master Planning Task Force explores the need for/timing of any new facilities.

We then translated the hub concept by looking at the larger campus and acquired properties in three main geographic areas with a focus on creation of hubs and activities/use for each hub. The goal being to create groupings of activities that make the "hub" a place for community across multiple activities/ages:

#### North Gate Hub

This includes the area from North Gate to the currently owned property near the bluff. The North Gate would serve as a starting point for the hub – think linear park -- which could have activity/facilities including options:

Rec Facility/Pavilion that can be multi-use, possible sports courts (pickleball, bocce, other), playground, splash pad, arts area, with restrooms/grilling facilities.

Multi-use facility at bluff. Use options include chapel, arts, gathering, weddings, concerts. A good example of this is the example Jasper Highland's pavilion.

#### **QUICK BITES**

ALL golf carts must be registered or re-registered every year. Only licensed drivers are legally allowed to drive carts

Lawn trimmings are collected on Wednesdays.

Dogs must be registered, including proof of rabies vaccination. Pick up after your pets.

The possession or use of alcohol or controlled substances on public grounds, in public places, or at public functions on the Assembly grounds is prohibited and subjects the offender to disciplinary action by the Board of Trustees.

Expanded trails/perimeter trail. Use of Chambers property for camping pavilion, capitalizing on current water/electric on-site; art trail.

Preserve bluff front for common use.

Housing Hub

Create small "village" of leaseholds for smaller single level cottages with consideration of options that create affordable leaseholds given the cash purchase requirement.

Front/Main Street Hub

Possible hub options:

Community field/space (sport field; trail (e.g. part of a perimeter trail); space for community farmers market) Housing/lodging space

MSSA office activity

#### VFW/Highway 41 Hub

Physical distance make it more difficult to make this an activity based hub. Possible use options include golf cart storage facility; workshop space

We continue to refine these topics; specifically, looking at factors that impact the ideas discussed above, such as topography and zoning. We are very excited about the opportunities presented and will continue to share our work as we move ahead.

Planning a renovation project? The Architectural Review Committee will accept projects for review and

recommendation to the Board of Trust for approval four times per year. Questions about possible projects, the process, and necessary requirements should be referred to the General Manager. Projects submitted by the following dates will be reviewed and presented at the board meeting following the submission.

> February 28 June 10 July 31 September 30 January 15

The ARC is available throughout the year to advise members on their project planning prior to submission of a request. Not sure if you need ARC approval? Check with the General Manager first.

While living in Naperville Jean was secretary and a director of Naperville Associates of the Art Institute of Chicago and served as secretary and as a director of Naperville Heritage Society. She was president of the Elmwood Home and School Association in Naperville. She and her husband served on the principal's advisory council for Naperville Central High School. She was a Den Mother for a Cub Scout troop. She promoted and assisted in an active sports program for her children. Among other things, she was her children's traveling companion to figure skating competitions, ice hockey tournaments, and tennis tournaments throughout the United States and Canada.
