When she wasn't traveling, she was taking care of her family with delicious southern, comfort food. No one could play "Boogie-woogie" quite like her. She made her piano rock. If you were lucky enough to know her, you were blessed to be loved by her.

She was preceded in death by her parents, Theodore Rousseau Duncan and Marie Goodpasture Duncan. In addition to her husband Tom, she is survived by her children: daughter Julia, of Nashville; son Kneel, of Salt Lake City; son Ted, of Eugene, OR; her brother Ted
