

When Abby Talbot talks about coming to Monteagle, there's a palpable excitement in her voice ... which belies the calm she's hoping to find while here this week. "There's just something about driving through the gates," she muses. Maybe it's all the trees providing shade?

Or maybe the slower pace of life just takes her mind off the hustle and bustle of her family's life in Memphis.



Either way, Abby's sure about a few things: Her four-year-old daughter Winn loves
