

He will be reading selections from the book at the Writers' Grove at 2:30 pm that day.




#### **NEWS FROM THE COURTS: MEN'S DOUBLES WINNERS**



MSSA friends, and Katherine says she might not have ever thought to attend the University of Tennessee had she not spent two weeks each summer at the Assembly.

Last summer, Katherine and Jeremy decided it was time to pick up the family tradition and bring their family here for two weeks. It was a significant enough time that her boys remember that trip last summer, and they're looking forward to reprising it for the next two weeks.

making the same kinds of lifelong friendships that have meant so much to Katherine. There will be pool time, crafts, going on hikes as family, and giving the tennis courts a try.

They'll probably have a chance to sit on the McTyeire porch, remembering the seat Grandma always claimed and the place where Grandpa's chair always sat. #### FROM THE ARCHIVES

Beginning in 1887, the Woman's Association has enjoyed a long history in the Assembly. The first Woman's Association building was completed in 1909. It was located on the northeast corner of the mall near Warren Chapel. The bazaar was a favorite event, sometimes held twice during the season. Local people brought everything from produce to handicrafts and sold them on the porch of this distinct building. The ladies sponsored everything from baby shows to receptions throughout the season. It also served as the Assembly library beginning in 1917, containing more than seven thousand books. In 1948, a fire swept through the Mall and destroyed the building, including the library. Following the fire, the Association bought Andrew Lytle's log cabin. In 1961, the cabin was sold back to Mr. Lytle, and

was moved to its present location, through the generous gift of Ella D. Winfield. The Woman's Association continues to be an integral part of Assembly life!
