
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From the President



MSSA Hosts AmeriCorps VISTAs

The AmeriCorps VISTA program is one of the largest VISTA (Volunteers in Service To America) projects in the state of Tennessee, the South Cumberland Plateau AmeriCorps VISTA Project serves an economically depressed region of rural Appalachia, including all of Grundy, and parts Marion and Franklin counties.

The program is jointly sponsored by the University of the South and South Cumberland Community Fund, supporting 14 VISTA projects focused on education, economic opportunity, and healthy futures. Sewanee's Office of Civic Engagement oversees the selection of VISTAs, the administration of the program, and placement in various nonprofit organizations across the plateau. The South



Cumberland Community Fund supplies the funding for the program. Service projects span a wide range of need in our community—from hunger relief, to opioid prevention and recovery, to childhood wellness through trauma-informed care, and much more.

An opportunity arose a few weeks back to rent rooms in the Nashville Home to VISTAs who need housing during their service while the Nashville Home is vacant out of season. This is a win-win for the VISTAs who are only allowed to make a wage at the poverty level and need affordable housing, and MSSA which has recently renovated space and can produce income to help maintain the building.

MSSA's support of the program in our community is consistent with our mission as a church to support needs in our community and fosters our relationship with the University of the South and the South Cumberland Community Fund.

In the Butterfly Garden, The Season is Just Beginning

As the Assembly season winded down, the season is finally revving up at the Smith-Boeth Monarch Butterfly Waystation. After a period of low numbers of visitors, the garden has come alive this week with an abundance of butterflies. Drifting waves of Swallowtails have been fluttering, playing, and sampling nectar throughout the garden. The most numerous variety is the Eastern Tiger Swallowtail, along with lesser numbers of Spicebush Swallowtails and Pipevine Swallowtails.

Sometimes three butterflies would be sharing the same blossom. We might have even had a Black Swallowtail laying eggs on the bronze fennel.

Caterpillars have been few in the garden so far, with one Black Swallowtail caterpillar and a horde



of Silvery Crescent crawlers eating our leaves so far.

Disappointingly, we have not seen a female Monarch visiting the garden, catching just one beautiful male that passed through a few weeks ago. Every year prior we have been fortunate to have at least a couple of Monarch mothers miraculously find our tiny patch of milkweed, and have been overjoyed to have new Monarchs born to help the species, which was just declared threatened. The season is still young for the Monarchs' southern migration, and thousands if not millions will start their way to Mexico from up north in coming weeks.

We remain hopeful our patch of milkweed will come in handy yet and promise to file a dispatch if that happens.

Nature is always full of beauty, wonder, and surprise, even as it dances to its own invisible rhythms. Butterflies never seen in the garden before, like the spictured Giant Swallowtail, passed through, and long-lost friends like the American Lady and the Variegated Fritillary (maybe laying eggs!) returned once again. Our favorite tiny butterfly, the Pearl Crescent, fit comfortably in the bowl of a black-eyed Susan. And a hummingbird came within close range of our camera as it enjoyed the nectar of a zinnia.

For those still in the Assembly, please visit anytime to enjoy the dance of the Swallowtails, and whatever other surprise that may be just a wingbeat away.
