# Platform Preview: Live Appraisal Event with Ken Farmer

In our upcoming 141<sup>st</sup> season, the Monteagle Summer School Assembly will welcome Farmer for two events in week 7.

But Ken needs your help, and here's how: On Thursday night that week, Farmer will conduct a live appraisal event. In the coming weeks, MSSA members will receive an email with a link to a form where you can submit pieces your family wants Ken to

The widow of Robert Gould Tharp, the second Episcopal Bishop of East Tennessee, she is survived by her children: Kent (Brent) Ballow, Andrew Ewing III, Christie Rolon and Ann (Scott) Ewing; her brother William H. (Lissa) Bradford; nieces Lissa Bradford and Lillian (Greg) Smith; five grandchildren: Robert Ballow, William (Julia) Ballow, Andrew Ballow, Charlie Ewing and Sara Ewing; and great grandchild Annie Ballow.

The daughter of Ewing Lehman Bradford and Christine Hampton Bradford, she was born November 27, 1934. She attended Ward Belmont and graduated from the first class of the Harpeth Hall School. She graduated from Holton Arms Junior College in Washington, D.C., and Wheelock College in Boston where she had the opportunity to spend several months studying art and history in Paris and travel in that region. It was an experience that shaped her life, and therefore, she always encouraged her children to travel, seek adventure, appreciate other cultures, and embrace curiosity.

In the 17 years prior to her marriage to Bishop Tharp, she was the MSSA platform superintendent, a position she cherished. She was a member of the Centennial Club in Nashville, Otey Memorial Parish in Sewanee, Tenn., and the Woman's Association of Monteagle Sunday School Assembly.

Holton-Arms Junior College in Washington, DC. She graduated Cum Laude from Vanderbilt University. Married to Dr. Innes Armistead Nelson for fifty-six years, she devoted herself wholeheartedly to family and the upbringing of their three children.

Her community work was extensive including leadership in the Medical Auxiliary and the Junior League of Nashville. A founding member of St. George's Episcopal Church, she served on the altar guild for years, attended innumerable Sunday school classes, engaged outreach projects, and lived out her faith with countless acts of kindness. A member of the Monteagle Sunday School Assembly, she was renowned for her enthusiastic hosting of children and grandchildren for extended, fun filled stays.

Throughout her life, she had a gift for friendship and extended graciousness to people in all generations and varied backgrounds. In later life, she took her place as the matriarch of an extended clan and won the adoration of all, especially that of her grandchildren.
