

## Platform Preview: Cassandra Quave, Plant Hunter

Conjure up an image of a worldfamous medical researcher, botanist, and Emory University professor. And now, meet Cassandra Quave, plant hunter—who is all of those things and so much more. She's a mom, a podcaster, an explorer, and ethnobotanist ... and she does it all in a body born with multiple congenital defects of her skeletal



nature—pun intended—is giving the keynote talk in the opening week of the 141st Platform season. Quave will talk about her work searching for natural compounds to help fight humankind's most threatening illnesses. Her lecture is on Thursday, June 15, at 7:45 pm in the Auditorium. Quave's web site promises a fascinating and inspiring talk: "Traveling by canoe, ATV, mule, airboat, and on



foot, [Quave] has conducted field research in the flooded forests of the remote Amazon, the murky swamps of southern Florida, the rolling hills of central Italy, isolated mountaintops in Albania and Kosovo, and volcanic isles arising out of the Mediterranean—all in search of natural compounds, longknown to Traditional healers, that could help save us all from the looming crisis of untreatable superbugs."

Robert "Bob" Bell Murfree of Murfreesboro, Tenn., passed away unexpectedly, surrounded by his family, on Friday, March 3, his 75th birthday. He was born in Rutherford County, Tenn., to the late Dr. Matthias Brickell Murfree, Jr., and Mary Kathryn Bell Murfree.

Bob is survived by his loving wife of 50 years, Elizabeth "Betsy" Phillips Murfree; his children: Dr. Robert Brickell Murfree and his wife Nikki Lowe Murfree, Dr. John Phillips Murfree, and Virginia "Gina" Murfree DeJean and her husband Grant Newman DeJean; his grandchildren: Samuel Hardy Murfree, Hugh Hardy Murfree, William Murfree DeJean, Elizabeth Kirtley DeJean, and James Brickell Murfree DeJean; and beloved nephews Matthias Brickell "Bricke" Murfree IV and Paul Davis Murfree. In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by his older brother, Matthias Brickell Murfree, III.

Descended from many of the oldest families of Rutherford County, Bob was a 1966 graduate of Central High School and earned his bachelor's degree from the University of the South at Sewanee in 1970. He was a graduate of the School of Banking of the South at Louisiana State University, the Tennessee Banking School at Vanderbilt University, and the Commercial Lending School at the University of Oklahoma. He served in the Tennessee National Guard from 1970-1976, where he was staff sergeant. Bob started his banking career in 1972, going on to found First City Bank in 1985, where he served as President and CEO until the bank was acquired in 1996. He then assumed the City President position of First Tennessee and later was the City President of

AmSouth Bank. Murfree retired in 2004 after 32 years of Banking.

Bob served his community in many roles, including the Board of Trustees of the University of the South, the St. Thomas Rutherford Foundation (formerly the MTMC Foundation), President of the Oaklands Mansion Board of Trustees, 1987 graduate of Leadership Rutherford, and founding member of the Old Man's Basketball League and the MTSU's 6th Man Club. Bob was passionate about the volunteer work he did for the Journey Home, First United Methodist Church disaster relief team and mission trips and most recently for Ascension St. Thomas Hospital. He was a member of the Silver Circle of Alpha Tau Omega Fraternity and the Society of the Cincinnati, and he was an ASTR Foundation Rutherford Society Lifetime Member.

Walter Brice Burbank "Brice", born on May 23, 1969 in Brooklyn, New York to Camilla and Terry Burbank. He attended McCallie School (C'87). He received both an economics degree and a master's degree in elementary education from the University of Tennessee, Chattanooga. A life-long Episcopalian and active member of the Church of the Good Shepherd, he served faithfully, participating in Happening, Cursillo, and Education for Ministry, serving on the Vestry, teaching Godly Play, and devoting himself to the children's ministry. Brice is survived by his devoted wife of 17 years, Christian Kizer Burbank (Christie), his children Beatrix Dudley Burbank (Bea, 13) and Walter Kizer Burbank (Kizer, 8), his loving parents, Terry and Camilla Burbank, his brother Berkeley Carroll Burbank (Ginny), and his sister, Laura Burbank Epperson (Chris).

He is preceded in death by his brother, McDaniel Swift Burbank, and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Whelan Burbank, and Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Brice. There is no doubt his most fulfilling and favorite role was that of proud and loving father to Bea and Kizer. He was Bea's biggest fan experiencing every play and musical performance with great pride and joy. He was Kizer's best friend – delighting in countless hours of games, Minecraft, Legos, RC cars, Nerf guns, and Hot Wheels with his favorite little guy.

Julia Hill Brownlow Pulliam, a longtime resident of Knoxville, Tenn., died March 17, in Atlanta, where, upon being widowed, she moved to be near her daughter, Mary. She was 96. Julia was born in Columbia, Tenn., on January 13, 1927, to Girard Polk Brownlow and Mary de Moville Hill Brownlow.

She attended the Columbia public schools before enrolling at the Mary Institute, a college preparatory school in St. Louis, Mo. Upon graduation, Julia continued her education at Holton Arms School in Washington, DC, and then at Vanderbilt University, where she especially enjoyed her membership in the Kappa Alpha Theta sorority.

Following college, Julia married Jere Dorminy, of Winter Haven, Florida. Two daughters, Mary and Julie, were born to the marriage but tragically Julie died at a young age from severe complications suffered during childbirth. Losing Julie left a hole in Julia's heart that never fully healed. Julia's life took a decidedly happy turn when, single again and aided by a matchmaker friend in Columbia, she met Walter Pulliam who was to become the love of her life. They were married until his death at age 101, in 2014, affording the two of them over four decades of shared love, mutual respect and a lot of fun.

Among their favorite interests was travel and especially enjoyed seeing markedly different countries and cultures, so Russia, China, India, Japan and more became "must see" destinations. But for Julia, one destination towered above all others. Julia spent parts or all of every summer of her life in Monteagle. Her home there was "the Alamo", which her family had acquired in 1922, five years before her birth. In her later years, it was a point of special joy to watch her great grandchildren become the sixth generation in her family to discover the magic of Monteagle. Fittingly, the last words she ever spoke were "Am I in Monteagle?" After that, she slept, until her end.

Julia had many talents, one being her gift for entertaining. She was also an exceptional flower arranger and took special delight in the summer in picking Monteagle wild flowers in the morning and gracing the dinner table with a colorful creation. Yet another passion of hers was bridge, which she played often and well. More important, Julia was a doer and a leader. Among her noteworthy activities was serving as the Town Committee Chair of the Knoxville Colonial Dames of America. She served on the Board of Blount Mansion in Knoxville and was active in the First Presbyterian Church in Knoxville. She volunteered in numerous other Knoxville undertakings and organizations. In Columbia, Julia worked tirelessly, including board service, 3 on behalf of James K. Polk Memorial Association.

She is survived by her daughter, Mary Doffermyre (Everette), her granddaughter and namesake, Julia Brownlow Doffermyre Green (Eli), of Atlanta; her grandson, William (Will) Lassiter Doffermyre (Bessie), of Dallas TX; her grandson, Everette Randolph (Randolph) Doffermyre (Kathleen), of Jackson, WY; and her nephew, Girard Polk Brownlow, III (Jane) of Palm Beach, FL. She is also survived by eight great grandchildren, all of whom share her love for Monteagle. She was predeceased by her husband, Walter Tillman Pulliam, her daughter, Julia (Julie) Hill Dorminy, and her brother, Girard Polk Brownlow, Jr.

A memorial service celebrating Julia's life will be held on June 30, 2023 at 4 PM in Warren Chapel. Contributions in memory of Julia may be made to the Monteagle Assembly or to any charity the donor chooses.
