#### THE CAMPAIGN FOR SUNSET ROCK

For decades, the 95+ acre Kraft property, including two houses and located on Sunset Rock, has been identified as a strategically desirable property to compliment the MSSA bluff line and forest area on top of the bluff. The Assembly acquired this property on May 31, 2023.

The acquisition of this property is a seminal moment for the Monteagle Sunday School Assembly. This land will give the Assembly a continuous bluff from the upper campground to Bragg's Point (Shannonhouse) and will give MSSA the opportunity to acquire Sunset Rock Road from the Town of Monteagle and close it to the public, thus enhancing our security and expanding our central campus to the north. Most importantly, the acquisition of this land will ensure there will not be residential development at the end of the road.

#### We Need Your Commitment

The Campaign for Sunset Rock will benefit the Eleanor Lanier Waldrop Land Acquisition Fund with your donation earmarked for the purchase of the Kraft Property. The goal of The Campaign for Sunset Rock is to raise \$1,600,000 and retire a line of credit during its three-year term. To date, leadership gifts in the amount of \$500,000 have been raised.

# WEEK TWO PLATFORM PREVIEW

Rev. Allyn Maxfield-Steele joins us this week as the Wayne & Virginia Jervis Bible Week lecturer. Since 2017, Steele has served as the co-executive director of the Highlander Research Education Center, the organization formerly known as the Highlander Folk Center. Highlander's historic contributions to civil rights organizing and education continue today; they "work with people fighting for justice, equality and sustainability, supporting their efforts to take collective action to shape their own destiny," according to their web site. Steele will lecture Tuesday-Friday mornings in Warren Chapel, drawing from his experiences at Highlander and elsewhere.

Grammy winner and 2019 inductee into the Nashville Songwriter's Hall of Fame, Marcus Hummon will present twice this week, on two very different topics. On Thursday evening, Hummon will share what he learned in writing and staging his most recent musical, American Prophet, which focuses on Douglass's life. The musical premiered in Washington, DC, last summer to sold-out audiences, and it went on to win the Edgerton Award and was nominated for six Helen Hayes Awards. His lecture is "The Making of American Prophet: Frederick Douglass in His Own Words," takes place at 7:45 pm Thursday in the Auditorium.

But that's not all! Hummon's career has spanned songwriting, musical performance, playwriting, and writing. Among his many notable artistic contributions are co-writing credits with Rascal Flatts, the Dixie Chicks, Tim McGraw, Winona

Judd, and the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band. On Friday evening, Hummon will perform with songs and stories from his own career at 7:00 pm in the Auditorium.

Cost is \$27 (adults) or \$13 (children 5-12 years). Kids 4 and under eat free. Prices include tax only. Please remember to tip your servers.

Salad bar: Garden-fresh baby salad greens with condiments; assortment of homemade salad; montage of fresh seasonal fruits.

Be aware of the wildlife living with us on the Assembly grounds. Skunks normally do not spray unless threatened. If you see one, slowly back away. Snakes are found around the creek and in rocky areas. Do not antagonize them. Coyotes have been spotted in the Assembly previously; increased activity may cause them to leave the campus, but we must all be mindful of letting small pets roam at night. Raccoons are everywhere. To avoid unwelcomed surprises, secure your garbage cans to prevent racoons from rummaging through your trash.
