

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WEEK THREE PLATFORM PREVIEW

Two noted political analysts will share their thoughts about the media's role in American election outcomes in an evening lecture Thursday, June 29. Larry Sabato, a well-known election prognosticator and professor of political science at the University of Virginia, will join Tennessean John Seigenthaler in conversation at the Auditorium at 7:45 pm that evening.

John Seigenthaler spent 11 years at NBC News, anchoring NBC Nightly News Weekend edi-

tion and appearing on *Meet the Press*, *TODAY*, and other wellknown NBC news programs. He serves on the Freedom Forum board of trustees, on the Peabody Awards board of jurors, and as a member of the judging committee for the RFK Journalism Awards. He works in public relations and communications consulting in Nashville.

Larry Sabato is one of the nation's most respected political analysts, appearing regularly on national and interna-

John Seigenthaler tional TV news networks, including CNN, BBC, and CNN International. A Rhodes

Scholar, Sabato founded and directs the University of Virginia's Center for Politics. He has written and edited two dozen books on American politics. You may know him from Sabato's Crystal Ball, recognized by the Pew Charitable Trust as the best-rated political predictor. Sabato has won four Emmys for PBS documentaries and is a best-selling *New*

Our schedule this week includes something for just about everyone on the Plateau! We welcome *Wall Street Journal* writer Laura Saunders Tuesday morning to talk about "Death and Taxes: When Life's Two Certainties Collide." Saunders writes the Tax Report, the oldest column at the Journal and a favorite among readers. Saunders is a Sewanee undergraduate alumna who attended Columbia University for graduate school. Her program takes place in Warren Chapel.

Sewanee professor **Chris McDonough** presents the weekly Plateau talk & excursion on Wednesday. Through his work with filmmaker Stephen Garrett on the films *Mine 21* and *Ghosts of Lone Rock*, McDonough is committed to preserving and sharing the history of the Plateau. *Mine 21* won the Austen Riggs Erikson Prize for Excellence in Mental Health Media in 2019, in addition to its acclaim during its run on PBS channels. McDonough and Garrett are now putting the finishing touches on *Ghosts of Lone Rock*, which looks at the Lone Rock Stockade in Tracy City, one of the largest private prisons that engaged in convict leasing. Sewanee Visiting Assistant Professor of History Camille Westmonth leads an excavation of the

site to shed light on the dark history of the practice and place. McDonough will talk about his work collaborating on these two film projects Wednesday morning in Warren Chapel. After lunch, he will lead a visit to the Lone Rock Stockade Archaeology Project site.

Retired lawyer-turned-filmmaker **Norman Jetmundsen** will screen his film, *UNRIVALED*, about the undefeated 1899 Sewanee football team. A 1976 graduate of Sewanee, Jetmundsen teamed up with his classmate David Crews to create the documentary in 2016. The film, billed as "the ultimate David & Goliath story," earned a regional Emmy nomination and inclusion in multiple film festivals. After a screening of the documentary Saturday at 7:45 pm in the Auditorium, Jetmundsen

will host a Q&A about the Sewanee football team's incredible season and his experiences writing, producing, and directing the film.



FROM THE ARCHIVES

This article appeared in the Chattanooga News on July 23, 1938

The Old Monteagle

The Monteagle colony gathers again for its religious and recreational summer. People from down in Mississippi and Louisiana and far away Arkansas come to take over the summer cottages their fathers and mothers built on the mountain before them. Maybe it needs modernizing and partial rebuilding—but year after year Monteagle goes on—the most lasting of the Southern summer mountain resorts.

It is the one John Moffat, a Canadian lecturer who wandered into Tennessee in the hectic days succeeding the Civil War, that the Monteagle Sunday School Assembly (for such is the official title of the enterprise) owes its being. Moffat came to Tennessee in 1866. By 1869 he had worked himself into the good graces of William G. Brownlow, the state's first post-war Governor, better known as the "Fighting Parson." The fiery preacher-politician made Moffat Commissioner of Immigration for Tennessee, and in the pursuit of the duties of that office, Moffat journeyed all over the state.

One such trip took him across the Cumberland Mountains, over the old Nashville and Chattanooga trail. The scenery and climate of the plateau so charmed him that he bought a large tract of land in the neighborhood of what is now Monteagle. He built a summer resort hotel and called it

Moffat. Five years later he moved his family there.

In 1881, a more ambitious project was started, a company was formed, and the name Moffat was abandoned for Monteagle. John Moffat contributed 100 acres of land and pledged himself to raise \$5,000. With this beginning, in 1882, the Monteagle assembly was opened. The first people lived in tents, soon, however, cottages, school buildings, teachers' homes and a hotel were built. Ever since, the Assembly has kept at its work.
