

WEEK FIVE PLATFORM PREVIEW

This week, Vanderbilt political historian and respected author Eli Merritt will lecture about his research on the ethics of democracy and the intersection of demagoguery and democracy Thursday evening in the Auditorium. His lecture focuses on "Alexander Hamilton's Theory of Democratic Collapse: A President Commences as a Demagogue and Ends as a Tyrant," which draws from his recently published book, *Disunion Among Ourselves: The Perilous Politics of the American Revolution*. Merritt's



background is an unconventional one; he earned a master's degree in ethics at Yale University before attending medical school at Case Western University. After a career working in psychiatric care and advocacy, he found a home at Vanderbilt to make a significant career pivot to political history.

For this week's Plateau talk & excursion, Gary McCracken will bring his deep expertise on bats to the Assembly with a lecture Wednesday morning on "The Seen and Unseen Benefits of Bats," taking place in Warren Chapel. That evening, McCracken will lead a bat walk for those interested in exploring the habitats of Plateau bats. McCracken is a professor emeritus in the Department of Ecology and Evolutionary Biology at the



University of Tennessee, Knoxville, where he taught for 42 years. His research focused on the ecology, behavior, and genetics of bats. To join the bat walk, meet at the North Gate at 7:45 pm Wednesday.

Call Scott First! Home repairs/ upgrades are generally not permitted during the season. Contact the Executive Director before calling a contractor.

Auto permits must be displayed at all times, else a ticket may be issued.

Gate tickets (or wristbands) should be on your person at all times.



RENTERS' SPOTLIGHT: HOW TRADITIONS BEGIN

The first two renters that I spoke with this week, Norris Gagnet (née Nelson) and Anne Byrn share similar stories of having been introduced to the Assembly at a young age.

Norris' family came for many summers as guests of Knox Van Zandt. This tradition came to an end shortly after she began college, only to recommence as she and her husband rented Cabbage Patch in the summer of 2008. Those early years led to some funny incidents as Nelson—"an independent spirit" who is now 17—was not yet old enough to be a Hummingbird. One day, as he had wandered off ahead, they experienced their greatest fear when he was not found waiting on them at the cottage. As most parents who are accustomed to the dangers of city living, they immediately feared the worst, only to discover that he was next door at Happy Castle. Norris walked in to find him on the couch, tucked under a patchwork quilt, drinking cranberry juice. His gracious host, Sydney Cattlet, mentioned how chatty he had been to then inform them that she couldn't understand a word he said... Another such day, he was found eating a pork chop dinner at Sallie Stroud's.

After many years of staying at Cabbage Patch, upon Sherrill Byrd's insistence that they use her laundry room, they began renting April Fools. The boys learned not to be afraid of dogs and how to use cash at the Snack Shop, while the adults learned the beauty of "relaxed spontaneity." Norris has been part of the Platform, instructing photography workshops, and their youngest son, Christopher, is still growing up through the ranks of the youth program.

Not only was Anne Byrn, like Norris, introduced to the Assembly when her mother and her aunts rented a cottage during her youth, only to begin a tradition with her husband and children in 1994 by renting Elderberry Patch, but she too has been a Platform instructor, leading cooking demonstrations and judging the cake-baking contest. Her upcoming book features the recipe for the choc-

olate pound cake she shared with her class last year. Her husband, John Whitaker, is no stranger to the Assembly either as he rented a small mother-in-law cabin during his fall semester at Sewanee in1974. A few occasions of dealing with busted pipes sent him back to the comforts of dorm life.

After 29 years of returning to the Mountain, Bryn marvels: "Where else can one go and learn about politics, gardening, faith, and food in one week?" Their children Kathleen (Hugh) Osteen, Litton, and John are all grown now, leaving Ann and John to also remark that, "The luxury of grown children is to be able to enjoy the lectures." Some of their favor-

ite aspects of Assembly summers has not only been what she described as "unexpected joy," but also the ability to experience many different cottages and their offerings as home (an experience she relishes as uniquely special), round robin tennis, last summer's performance by After Hours Barbershop Quartet, and the farmers' market.

After featuring these two remarkable families and their introduction to a place where they continued to return, even if other family members did not, I'd like to introduce you all to a family who is here for the first time this week, the Angelillos.

As friends of Lindsey and Evan Price, Margaret and her husband, Tommie, are renting a cottage as first-time visitors to the Mountain. Hailing from Mountain Brook, Alabama, they are excited for their first Chautauqua experience. They have two daughters: Louise (age 8) and Annie (age 6)

We may not always take the time to consider how traditions begin, but in contemplating such, I am reminded of Khalil Gibran's idea that love is a spiritual affinity that is created in a moment. Whether it's during an evening stroll across the Mall or while enjoying the lightning bugs from the porch, the beauty of life inside these gates can suddenly strike us, causing us to stop, look around, and say to ourselves, "I want these moments to last a lifetime."

Rhea Gate at Monteagle To Be Opened Saturday

The beautiful Isaac Taylor Rhea memorial gate to the assembly grounds at Monteagle, Tenn., will be opened Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock with appropriate ceremonies celebrating the occasion. The gate is picturesque, being made of Sewanee stone and ornamental iron work. Isaac Rhea, Jr. formerly of Nashville, but more recently a resident of New Orleans, erected it as a memorial to his father, who was a prominent grain dealer in Nashville and was instrumental in the development of Southern waterways. Invitations for the exercises formally opening the gate have been issued by the Monteagle Sunday School Assembly.
