Auto permits must be displayed at all times, else a ticket may be issued.

Gate tickets (or wristbands) should be on your person at all times.

Harton Hall accepts cash, major credit cards, or Venmo. The office no longer maintains dining house accounts.

Save time at the gate and preorder your tickets by calling (931) 924-2286. You can also preorder online.

ALL golf carts, including rental carts, must be registered (or re-registered) to receive the 2023 decal. Only licensed drivers are legally allowed to drive carts.

Lawn trimmings are collected on Wednesdays.

Dogs must be registered, including proof of rabies vaccination. Pick up after your pets.


When you bring your side dish, make sure you:



- United for Literacy: This nonprofit organization funds each classroom with a field trip aligned to the curriculum free of charge.
- Literacy Boot Camp: Volunteers from the community, Monteagle-Sewanee Rotary, and students from the University of the South participated in two boot camps to increase student fluency to improve third-grade TCAP proficiency scores.
- Pam Maloof is the coordinator of the handbell choir for K-4th grade students. They play at basketball and volleyball games, along with many other events.
- Blessings for Backpacks: Students with needs can receive a
 bag of non-perishable items each Friday during the school
 year thanks to a Monteagle-Sewanee Rotary Grant.
- MES received a 10K Technology Grant from Pilot to update the auditorium.
- Monteagle-Sewanee Rotary provided \$1,700 to purchase AV
 equipment, speakers, and a projector screen for our gymnasium so students have opportunities to learn during PE and
 provide better quality during presentations.
- We are in the process of partnering with the University of the South and Monteagle-Sewanee Rotary to incorporate a **chorus for 5th-8th grade students** for the 23-24 school year.



FROM THE ARCHIVES: MSSA & CHINA!

During the summer of 2022, I received an email from Lei-Guang Huang, inquiring about Dr. Charles F. Mackenzie, who was the comptroller of MSSA for several years. In the early 1900s, he was also a Baptist missionary to Kinhwa, China. During the 1920s, Dr. Mackenzie was working at the Pickford Memorial Hospital (known locally as the Gospel Hospital) in Kinhwa. Jin-lou, Lei-Guang's grandfather, was very ill and was brought to the hospital. Dr. Mackenzie was instrumental in saving his life. Lei-Guang Huang will tell



the story of how Jin-lou chose to spend the rest of his life as a Christian, as a tribute to Dr. Mackenzie. Against all odds he built a church in what became The People's Republic of China. Lei-Guang accepted our invitation to present his incredible family story on Tuesday (July 25) at 10:45 am. Come listen at the Chapel!
