TUESDAY AFTERNOON WALK AND TALK

Walk with Jennifer as she tells about the state of the Assembly's tree canopy and the Reforestation Committee's plans to make it sustainable. Hear about the Assembly's efforts to save the habitat-important Hemlocks from the Hemlock Wooly Adelgid, an invasive exotic insect, and future efforts to save ash trees from the Emerald Ash Borer epidemic. Jennifer, an Assembly member and chair of the Reforestation Committee, is Nashville's Horticulturist, where she focuses on urban forestry and coordinates the Metro Tree Advisory Committee. Previously, Jennifer served as the Director of the Tennessee Urban Forestry Council. The Assembly participates in the Council's Arboretum Certification Program and their Landmark, Historic and Heritage Tree Registry.



Opening Lecture of the 139th Platform: Assembly Jeopardy: A Tribute to Alex Trebek

Laura Marsh, A Primer to Local Bird Life: Avian Conservation Efforts

Learn about our native bird wildlife, conservation efforts, and the ways you can attract them to your backyard in these lectures and guided walks by field ornithologist Laura Marsh. Laura Marsh is a field ornithologist and conservation biologist who has worked at various institutions, including the Smithsonian Migratory Bird Center and Cornell University. Laura recently founded Nova Conservation, an organization that connects wildlife scientists with non-biologists to engage in unique,

research-focused trips. She serves as the secretary for the Chattanooga Audubon Society, and teaches Environmental Science at UTC.



Thursday, June 17, 10:45 a.m., The Auditorium Nenette Arroyo, Mapping and Shaping a New World: The Power of Representation

Maps are more than navigational guides. In the era of European exploration and empire, maps were instruments of power, and transformers of space and identity. They communicated a vision of foreign lands that justified the colonial mission to conquer and Christianize. This talk examines how maps shaped the European perception of America, as a New World. Nenette Arroyo holds a PhD in Art and Architectural History at the University of Virginia and an MA in the History of Decorative Arts and Design, Parsons the New School University. At the University of Virginia, her research has been supported by the Americas Center, the Institute of the Humanities and Global Cultures, and the Center for Global Inquiry and Innovation.


WEEK 1 LECTURE DESCRIPTIONS

Dr. Arroyo presents a second lecture, California Mission Architecture: Reality, Ruins, and Romance

Adobe walls, tiled roofs, and bell towers define the architectural signature of California's Spanish past. We shall explore the development of this building and decorative style, from its European and Mexican influences, to the contributions of Indigenous culture and local artisans. We shall also examine its role in

defining a distinct history and identity for the Golden State.



Thursday, June 17, 8:15 p.m., The Auditorium Dr. Katherine Wilkinson, All We Can Save: Leading on Climate with Truth, Courage, and Solutions

"My heart is moved by all I cannot save," poet Adrienne Rich writes. Yours may be too — and by all that we, together, still can. In this lecture, Dr. Katharine Wilkinson will share vital insights from the bestselling anthology All We Can Save. As the mighty chorus in this collection shows, there is a renaissance blooming in the climate movement. Summoning truth, courage, and solutions, we may turn away from the brink and toward a just and livable future for everyone. Dr. Katharine Wilkinson is an author, teacher, co-founder of The All We Can Save Project, and co-host of the podcast A Matter of Degrees. Her books on climate include All We Can Save, The Drawdown Review, Drawdown, and Between God & Green. Time named her one of 15 "women who will save the world."
