### FROM THE ARCHIVES



Completed 1884, the Hall of Philosophy is the oldest public building in the Assembly. The barnlike structure was enclosed with walls nearly forty feet high. The porch was added in 1936. It was originally the headquarters of the Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Circle. By 1894, the Summer School of Physical Culture began with Prof. Gwathmey from Vanderbilt University and a full corps of instructors. It



claimed to be the only school of its kind in the South, systematically teaching the most advanced and difficult exercises on all gymnastic apparatus.

For the Tools 4 School, Morton Memorial members buy and pack all the supplies that ALL children at Monteagle Elementary School need to make their school year successful. For Christmas on the Mountain, Morton members buy Christmas presents geared to helping people on the mountain buy presents for their children at a reduced price. Tickets prices are \$12/adult, \$6/children aged 12 and under. Call Scott First! Home repairs/ upgrades are generally not permitted during the season. Contact the General Manager before calling a contractor.

Auto permits must be displayed at all times, else a ticket may be issued.

Gate tickets (or wristbands) should be on your person at all times.

**Set up a Harton Hall** account for cash-free dining all season long.

Box lunches and other reservations-required dining events must be paid at the main office; dining hall staff do not accept reservations or payment.

Save time at the gate and preorder your tickets by calling (931) 924-2286. You can also preorder online.

ALL golf carts must be registered (or re-registered) to receive the 2019 decal. Only licensed drivers are legally allowed to drive carts.

Lawn trimmings are collected on Wednesdays.

**Dogs** must be registered, including proof of rabies vaccination. Pick up after your pets.

Quiet Hour is daily from 1:00-2:30 pm. Children should be indoors at their cottages. Tennis is only permitted on the East Gate courts. No deliveries during this time.

Trash pickup begins at 5:00 am on Monday & Thursday. Secure garbage can lids to avoid critters from getting into them. Garbage crews can only collect bagged trash located inside garbage cans.

### RENTER'S SPOTLIGHT: 'A WHOLE WEEK OUT OF A PICTURE BOOK'

As kids, both Patrick and Amy Baggett came to Monteagle in the summertime a few times, either visiting friends with family cottages or to stay at Edgeworth. So when the Baggetts started their family and began looking for things to do in the summer, their thoughts turned to the Assembly and its unique pace of life.

With their friends from Nashville, the Nelsons, this couple has now made July 4th at MSSA a four -peat summer tradition. Asked to summon up a memory from those four summers that captures the essence of Monteagle, Amy reflects on that moment at the end of the day on the Fourth, when you're watching fireworks after a "picture-perfect day," with kids running around with glo-sticks and being surrounded by family and friends: "It's so picturesque... I'm so thankful for that. There's just such joy in that moment," she says.

Patrick shares the moment when, standing outside the Chapel at Hampton Sides's lecture Friday, the couple in front of him turned around and revealed themselves to be a connection from back home in Franklin, Tenn. That couple had come down to stay at Edgeworth, and Patrick says that moment of realization—that both couples share an appreciation for the Monteagle pace of summer life—probably means they will have a connection they didn't have before.

Their two older daughters—Eleanor (age 5) and Eliza (age 3)—have especially enjoyed their time as Hummingbirds, taking time to show off the tie-dye t-shirts they made this week. The girls also love going to the movies at the Auditorium and (of course) partaking of the goodies on offer at the Snack Shop.

Patrick and Amy appreciate evenings going out to Warren Point with their family and friends. After the kids go to bed, around 7:30, they sit on their cottage porch with their friends and just enjoy the rare quality time to connect, talk, and play games.





They always try to take some day trips to the small towns around, including an annual visit to Hammer's in Winchester. Amy is especially proud of the bargains she found on this trip, but laments that those bargains are because the store is closing.



Ultimately, it's clear this family appreciates summer weeks at the Assembly because it affords them the opportunity to enjoy their daughters, including 3-month-old Ruthie, in a way life back home doesn't always allow. "There's no rush—that's really special," Amy says. "Even at the picnic... when you eat meals with small kids, you're often just trying to get through it. But here, you're not rushing to get through. There's just no rush."

### WEEK 5 PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS

### **MONDAY**

8:15 pm, Warren Chapel: Look & See: A Portrait of Wendell Berry (2016) documentary:, with an introduction + Q&A with Ben & Virginia Berry Aguilar: Look & See revolves around the divergent stories of several residents of Henry County, Ken., who each face difficult choices that will dramatically reshape their relationship with the land and their community. Filmed across four seasons in the farming cycle, the film blends observational scenes of farming life, interviews with farmers and community members with evocative, carefully framed shots of the surrounding land-scape.

### **TUESDAY**

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Homecoming, Membership, & the Resettling of America," with Ben & Virginia Berry Aguilar: In their work at the Berry Center in New Castle, Ken., the Aguilars work with the community and other organizations to encourage rural reading, agrarian cultural discussion, and produce the Berry Center's annual Kentucky Arts & Letters Day. They will share insights from Wendell Berry's and their own individual work.

8:15 pm, Warren Chapel: "United States Commercial Diplomacy: From the Brink of Elimination to the Dawn of New Era for United States Development Finance," with Will Doffermyre: As vice president and general counsel of the Overseas Private Investment Corporation, Doffermyre provides legal guidance on finance, political risk insurance, and investment funds. OPIC is a self-sustaining U.S. government agency helping American businesses to invest in emerging markets.

### WEDNESDAY

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Playing Shakespeare," with the Nashville Shakespeare Festival & youth workshop participants: This high-energy acting workshop (for Eagles, Buzzards, and Falcons—see p. 27 in the program book) culminates in a morning performance Wednesday, starring players with the Nashville Shakespeare Festival and participants in the workshop. Participants will showcase what they've learned about how to approach Shakespeare's wide range of characters and text, all with a rollicking sense of adventure.

### **THURSDAY**

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "The Other Fellow Might Be Right: The Civility of Howard Baker," with Bill Haltom: A longtime friend and colleague of Senator Howard Baker (R-Tenn.), Bill Haltom will share stories of Baker's leadership style and personality. Baker was often called "the great conciliator," as he was able

to bring Democrats and Republicans together to work on issues of common concern. Baker was a senator, an ambassador to Japan, and worked as chief of staff in the Reagan White House.

8:15 pm, Warren Chapel: An Evening with Rebecca Wells and the Ya-Ya Sisterhood: Beloved author Rebecca Wells will bring her traveling one-woman show to the Assembly Thursday evening. Her book is about mothers and daughters, female friendships, alcoholism, and spirituality, and won the American Booksellers Award, in addition to being short-listed for the Orange Prize. Now a Nashville resident, Wells is currently working on her first memoir and volunteering for a variety of social justice initiatives.

### **FRIDAY**

10:45 am, Warren Chapel: "Food and Medicine Foraged from Forests: Significance, Impacts, & Implications Under Changing Climate," with Dr. James L. Chamberlain: As a research scientist with the USDA Forest Service, Chamberlain is a global expert on non-timber forest products management, production, and valuation. His research focuses on quantifying and articulating the ecological and economic impacts of harvesting non-timber forest products, especially edible and medicinal forest products.

3:00 pm, Pulliam Center: Adult Writing Workshop, with Rebecca Wells: Wells, the NYT bestselling author of Divine Secrets of the Ya-Ya Sisterhood, will offer an intimate workshop designed to heighten the art of listening and explore its link to writing and to our wider lives. In an atmosphere of mutual discovery, delight, and support, the group will explore writing prompts, reading, and discussion. There will not be manuscript critiques or publishing discussions; instead, this workshop is about naming and claiming our creativity, and experiencing its power to heal. There's no need to consider yourself a "writer" to feel at home here.
