WEEK ONE PLATFORM PREVIEW

Nationally recognized medical ethnobotanist **Dr. Cassandra Quave**, known as the plant hunter, gives the first keynote lecture of the season on Thursday evening. Quave's research focuses on the medical uses of natural plants. Her work has taken her around the globe to collect, identify, and test the next generation of medicinal plants. She documents this work in her academic scholarship and in her book, *The Plant Hunter: A Scientist's Quest for Nature's Next Medicines*, which she will sign following her lecture. On Friday morning, Sewanee-based writers **Steve Brallier** and **Lynn Beck** will discuss their book, *Mitka's Secret*, which shares the story of Mitka Kalinski. The book tells the remarkable story of this Ukrainian-born Jewish man who spent years in a Nazi concentration camp before being taken to the home of a German soldier as a household slave. Brallier and Beck collaborated on the telling of this important story in their book, co-written with Joel Lohr. They'll talk about writing Mikta's story in a morning lecture, followed by a book signing. At 2:30 Friday afternoon, they'll read from the book at the Writers' Grove (rain location is in Warren Chapel).

On Wednesdays this season, MSSA will feature lectures and excursions that explore places and topics specific to the Cumberland Plateau. In the first week of the season, Sewanee professor **Karen Kuers** will lecture Wednesday morning on "Plateau Forests: Food, Medicine, and More." Following lunch, Kuers will lead a Plateau Walk, "Forest Foraging for Food, Medicine, Health, and More." Those who want to participate should meet in front of the MSSA Auditorium at 1:00 pm.

Please join us at as many of these services as you can. They are a large part of the Monteagle Sunday School Assembly experience.



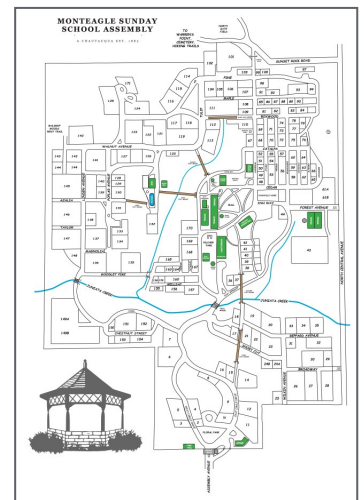
FROM THE ARCHIVES

BEWARE OF THE WILDLIFE

Be aware of the wildlife living with us on the Assembly grounds. Skunks normally do not spray unless threatened. If you see one, slowly back away. Snakes are found around the creek and in rocky areas. Do not antagonize them. Coyotes have been spotted in the Assembly previously; increased activity may cause them to leave the campus, but we must all be mindful of letting small pets roam at night. Raccoons are everywhere. To avoid unwelcomed surprises, secure your garbage cans to prevent raccoons from rummaging through your trash.
