## FROM THE ARCHIVES: THE CARRÉ SPOON!

This past winter, the Archives Committee received an inquiry about information concerning Elvira Beach Carré (Mrs. William W. Carré) of New Orleans, LA, from her great grandson, Darwin Beach Carré III. Mrs. Carré bought Cottage #105 in 1905 to escape the New Orleans summer heat and to participate in the religious activities of the Assembly. She remained very involved in the Assembly for 15 years. During her tenure, the cottage was named Carré Villa, but today it is known as Highland Villa.



After several weeks of sleuthing, we found information on Mrs.



tage. Mrs. Carré was president of the Woman's Association from 1908-1916. In response to a questionnaire sent out for the Centennial Celebration, Isabel Carré Preston (Mrs. William Preston, born 1901), her granddaughter, said, "I have a souvenir spoon given to me by my grandmother on my eighth birthday with an etching in the bowl of the Woman's Building. She was one of the presidents." The spoon

is engraved on the back of the bowl with the name of

Elvira Carré son, Darwin Beach Carré, May 3, 1910. It is thought by the family that perhaps each child was given a teaspoon in celebration of her involvement in the Woman's Association.

Carré and the cot-

Her great grandson donated the spoon to the Assembly in her honor, for which we are very grateful. The spoon is on display in the Pulliam Center for the season.

# BEWARE OF THE WILDLIFE

Be aware of the wildlife living with us on the Assembly grounds. Skunks normally do not spray unless threatened. If you see one, slowly back away. Snakes are found around the creek and in rocky areas. Do not antagonize them. Coyotes have been spotted in the Assembly previously; increased activity may cause them to leave the campus, but we must all be mindful of letting small pets roam at night.

Please secure your garbage cans! There is a critical critter problem (racoons and foxes especially) and garbage is everywhere!

#### WEEK 2 PLATFORM PREVIEW

The Rev. Guy Erwin joins us this week as the Wayne & Virginia Jervis Bible Week lecturer. The focus of his Bible Week talks is "The Gifts of Sacred Encounter: Scripture, the Artistic Imagination, and the Pilgrimage of Faith." In his presentations, Erwin will reflect on four texts from the Gospels and Acts that give us vivid descriptions of encounters "on the road" that changed those in the story and are meant to change us as well. Images created by artistsboth ancient and contemporary-add a visual component and a powerful perspective on well-known stories. A church historian by training, Erwin was trained to rely on documents and the analysis of texts. Over his career, he has branched out toward the visual arts and material culture as sources for historical study. This had led him to incorporate art-especially paintings and prints-into almost all his lectures.

Vanderbilt University political historian Eli Merritt speaks Thursday evening to share a work-in-progress he calls "a general theory of democracy," which he described in his recent Substack newsletter as asserting "that checks & balances against the rise of demagogues and authoritarians to executive power are co-equal in importance with the will of the people in sustaining a democracy." He argues that the Republican Party nominating Donald Trump as its presidential candidate twice (soon for a third time) represents a "fatal flaw" in American democracy, a "gross defect in our system—in both parties, it is important to understand—that must be remedied, or else our democracy will continue its preventable downward sputter into corruption, violence, and authoritarianism."

Singer/songwriter **Bradley Cole Smith** is a fixture in the Atlanta music scene since the 1990s. His latest album, The Hilltop, features a lush, rootsy landscape with diverse instrumentation. Saturday evening, Smith brings his music to the Mall Gazebo for "A Night Under the Stars with Bradley Cole Smith." Visitors are invited to bring lawn chairs or picnic blankets, as Mall seating is limited, and enjoy an evening of music starting at 8:00 p.m.


