COTTAGE TOUR PREVIEW

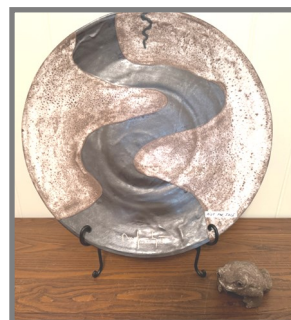
The 60th Annual Cottage Tour & Bazaar will take place on Friday, July 19. Cottages on the tour this year are:

BEWARE OF THE WILDLIFE

Be aware of the wildlife living with us on the Assembly grounds. Skunks normally do not spray unless threatened. If you see one, slowly back away. Snakes are found around the creek and in rocky areas. Do not antagonize them. Coyotes have been spotted in the Assembly previously; increased activity may cause them to leave the campus, but we must all be mindful of letting small pets roam at night.

Please secure your garbage cans! There is a critical critter problem (raccoons and foxes especially) and garbage is everywhere!

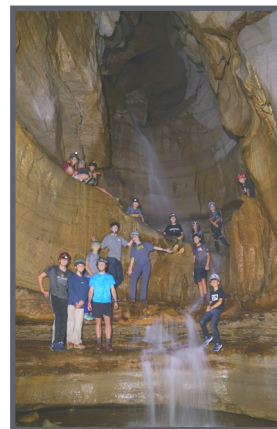

WEEK 3 PLATFORM PREVIEW

Local caving experts **Joey Favaloro** and **Jeffrey Reynolds** will give this week's Plateau Talk on "Dancing in the Dark: Caves of the Cumberland Plateau" in Warren Chapel Wednesday morning. These two cave enthusiasts have been leading tours of local caves for years. Joey belongs to the Big Light Speleology group, whose motto is "No cave too far, too dark, too deep." Jeff has been exploring the caves of the Cumberland since the 1960s.



After their morning lecture, Favaloro and Reynolds will lead an afternoon excursion to Soda Straw Cave (pre-registration required; inquire at the MSSA office).

Thursday's morning lecturer brings Nashville healthcare benefits management consultant **Margaret Smith** to the Chapel to lecture on, "Medicare Explained: Learning the Basics and Navigating the Maze." The daughter and granddaughter of Nashville-based physicians, Smith has always felt an affinity for healthcare. Earlier in her career, she worked at St. Thomas Hospital, where she created an insurance program for older adults. She now works through her company, Medical Accounts Management, to provide healthcare benefits services to employers.

Later that evening, join songwriter **Daniel Tashian** for a performance at the Auditorium sure to delight your ears.



Tashian is a two-time Grammy-award-winning artist, songwriter, and producer. Tashian has worked closely with, among others, Kacey Musgraves and Burt Bacharach. His most recent

album is the critically acclaimed *Night After Night*, released in 2022.

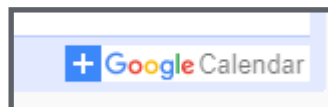
CULINARY EVENT JUNE 25TH
