### FROM THE ARCHIVES: HEAR THEM NOW

Next Tuesday morning, July 2nd at 10:45 am in the Auditorium, the Archive Committee will present a very special program, "Hear Them Now: Lost Voices of the Assembly." In the late 70s and early 80s last century, the Archive Committee—at that time, led by Oliver Jervis, Sandra Polk, and others—conducted dozens of oral history interviews with distinguished elders of the Assembly, folks like Judge Lucy Howorth, Franklin Taylor, Ruth Crais Utley, Dr. George Archer, Knox Polk Van Zandt, Corrine "Tinnie" Blake, Harry Lee Billington, Jean Murray, Annie Byrne Roberts, and many others.

Their stories were transcribed and used in the wonderful centennial book produced at that time, *Mountain Voices*. The old cassette tapes themselves, preserving the actual voices and spirit of the speakers, have never been heard in public. Until, that is, this coming Tuesday when we will fill the Auditorium with their stories of the Assembly from 1900 to the early 1960s.

Last year, committee chair Morgan Merrill had all the old cassettes digitized. Rick Boeth has spent many days and nights distilling the more than 60 hours of interviews on the cassettes into a

50-minute audio and visual presentation, told exclusively in their own voices and including many rare photos and other materials from the archives.

Archives will in the days following the presentation be able to make available to family members and others the digital recordings and transcripts for them to enjoy. The recording of oral histories has continued in the decades since, but this presentation is limiting itself to the original centennial cassettes. A directory will be shared. One can simply direct a request to archives@mssa1882.org.

We at the Archives Committee are thrilled to be able to share these priceless pieces of our shared history with you.

# BEWARE OF THE WILDLIFE
