If you haven't noticed, there has been a resurgence in adult tennis here at the Assembly, started by former chair, Margaret Rixham, who came up with many great ideas to breathe new life into a beloved game. Four years ago, Margaret and Meghan Hudgins spearheaded the idea of having the men's tournament on the weekend of July 4th, when more men are actually on the grounds.

The Mabry sisters, Betsy Peebles and Jane Jackson, took over as tennis chairs upon Margaret's retirement and have continued the work Margaret began. 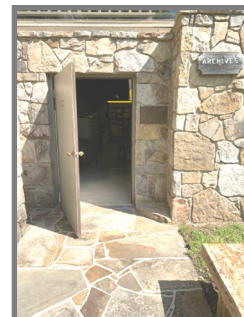


FROM THE ARCHIVES: SEND US COTTAGE PHOTOS!

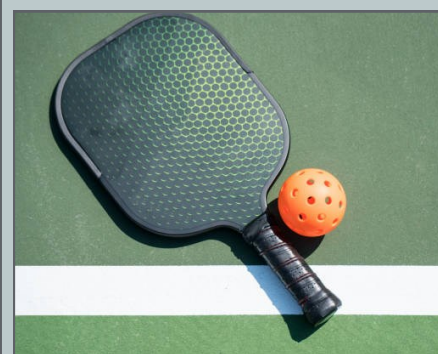

COTTAGE TOUR UPDATES

Parking and check-in for the Woman's Association Cottage Tour is at the North Gate, 995 Sunset Rock. Cost for parking is \$5 per vehicle. Snakes are found around the creek and in rocky areas. Do not antagonize them. Coyotes have been spotted in the Assembly previously; increased activity may cause them to leave the campus, but we must all be mindful of letting small pets roam at night.

Please secure your garbage cans! There is a critical critter problem (raccoons and foxes especially) and garbage is everywhere!

Join us on Saturday, July 27 at 5:30 pm for a New England-style crab boil! Menu includes:

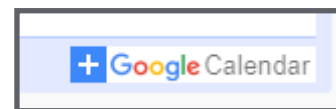
