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
JOIN US FOR DINNER ON THE CHAPEL GROUNDS

PROGRAM CHANGES & PLATFORM PREVIEW

There are a few program changes this week to note:

- Thursday evening will be an encore of "Hear Them Now: Lost Voices of the Assembly," hosted in the Auditorium by Rick Boeth and the Archives Committee. Unfortunately, filmmaker Steve Ross is unable to be with us this year.
- Everyone's favorite (we hope) resident political scientist, Liz Norell, has insisted she simply must give a pop-up lecture she's calling, "How George Washington Warned Us—and Why We Must Listen in 2024." Join her in Warren Chapel on Monday at 2:30 pm for a guided tour through George Washington's Farewell Address that will emphasize how President Washington foresaw the political divisions overtaking our politics ... and what we can do to thwart them.

Here are two more programs you won't want to miss...!



After working in public health for five years, Jill Melton helped bring Cooking Light, a magazine in Birmingham, Alabama, from infancy to a household name. She drew from that experience when she moved to Nashville, where she started Relish magazine—a publication that grew into one of the largest food publications in the country, with more than 16 million readers. For her next challenge, Melton cashed in her 401K—no investors involved—to start Edible Nashville, which is part of the Edible Communities (ECI) network. ECI has more than 80 magazines throughout the US and Canada, all run by independent publishers and editors. ECI har-

nesses the power of all the local markets to expand the voice and action. Since the first issue rolled out in March/April 2014, Jill has grown *Edible Nashville* to a 360 brand, complete with signature Farm Dinners taking place three times a year, cooking classes, partnerships, a robust website, newsletters, and an active presence in the local farm-to-table movement. She will lecture on "How to Eat with the Season and the Importance of It" Thursday morning

in the Auditorium.

The next day, visitors will continue on the theme of eating well with a lecture from Perre Coleman Magness, a freelance food writer, recipe developer, and the cook behind the website *The Runaway Spoon*, which features creative recipes with a southern slant. Known as PC, Magness describes herself as "like most people," in that she's somewhere "between a food snob and a food schlub." Her Friday morning lecture, taking place in the Auditorium, is on "Re-Discovering Southern Food and Writing About It."

Be aware of the wildlife living with us on the Assembly grounds. Skunks normally do not spray unless threatened.

If you see one, slowly back away. Snakes are found around the creek and in rocky areas. Do not antagonize them. Coyotes have been spotted in the Assembly previously; increased activity may cause them to leave the campus, but we must all be mindful of letting small pets roam at night.
